At this an officer arrested St in, Hart and Wimberly, and placed them under bonds to keep the peace one year. During all this time Luing stood across the street and did not instood across the street and did not in-terfere. Stein was brought here about a year ago charged with forging on the New York Sun. Washington, July 20.—The Inter-State Commission to-day dismissed the following cases: The Chicago & Alton against the Pennsylvania, and the Rock Island against the New York Central; F. D. The cases of the Alton and Rock Island roads dismissed, are the noted complaints of those companies against the Penns, Ivania and New York Cen-tral railways respectively, for dis-criminations in the "boycott" against the complainants, because of their refusal to subscribe to he agreement of the trunk lines, not to pay a commission to the ticket agents. This boycott consisted of the refusal on the part of the defendants to sell

THROUGH TICKETS

over complanants' roads from Chicago to Kausas city and St. Louis. The decision of the icommission says in part, after detailing the circumstances of the case at great length, that the offenses of which it has prizance are austhing done in contravention of the provisions of the act to regulate com-merce The law in this instance does not in terms require one railroad com-pany to sell through tickets over the load of another company. In the absence of a statutory authority one road can only sell tickets and check baggage over another by mutual agreement. If the companies can agree upon this they have the right to do so, and by this agreement become inter-state carriers, but if they

CANNOT AGREE the act does not undertake to coerce

them. Assuming for the sake of argu-ment that through tickets may be deemed "facilities" for the receiving, forwarding and delivering of passengers to connecting lines, carriers are only required to afford reasonable, proper and equal facilities. This presents the question whether the payment of commissions is in itself, or as incidental to the enjoyment of the facility, reasonable and statute. These commissions are gratuities to induce special efforts for the commerce of the lakes. does not give one company authority to subsidize the agents of another company, and if the practice is injurious in its effects, it certainly cannot be reasonable land proper. The statute does not divest a railroad company

to control its own internal affairs, to employ its own agents, to regulate their duties, compensation, etc. With the legitimate exercise of these powers another company has no concern and no right to intermeddle. The defendant companies have forbidden their agents to receive commissions from other companies and directed them not to sell over, the roads of the companies that refuse to recognize this corporate authority but insist on subsidizing agents. In these directions the defendants have not transcended their reasonable rights. They might rest upon these rights, but they go further and shaw by evidence the practical effects of the commissions, and that their natural and usual tendencies are to a variety of abuses. A practice capable of producing, and having the tendency of producing EXCLUSIVE RIGHT

SUCH RESULTS cannot be reasonable or proper, and a railroad company is fully justified in the use of all lawful precautions to protect itself and its agents against anch invasion of its corporate authority and its business morality. The
