PROVO. TO IMPROVE WATER WORKS.

Provo, Utah Co., Aug. 17.—There has been considerable discussion among water takers from the waterworks system on account of the water at times being muddy and otherwise impure. In order to remedy this the city has located a number of springs in Provo canyon and is the intention to proceed as rapidly as possible with the work necessary to convey the water from the springs into the waterworks system and use the spring water instead of the city water, which has heretofore been used. When this change is made Provo expects to have the best water of any city in the state. The springs of which notice of appropriation for this purpose has been filed with the county recorder are:

1. A spring known as "Lost Creek," about one-half mile north of Thayer's place; all the springs that are situated about 250 yards west of Thayer's place; two springs on the south side of the road, known as the "springs of water flowing across Burbeck's flat at the old toll gate, and all the springs situated from three to five hundred yards below the power house of the Telluride Power Transmission company.
