Aug. 13 .- The good people of Teton and vicinity have been at work here for over twelve years trying to bring the water out of this creek onto the lands to the east of the town of Teton. It was a big task. The canal is now constructed, but it will not hold water. When it reaches the lava rock formation the water sinks, so a ditch will have to be constructed to go around the rocky places. Much work and means have been expended on this canal system with as yet no returns. There is an abundance of good land along the course of this canal. In ordinary seasons dry land grain can be produced with success.

Up the Canyon creek, about four miles above where the county road crosses it, is located the hot springs; they are located on the top of a hill that has been built up by the lime deposited by the action of the water, the work of ages. The spring forms a pretty pond several yards in circumference, forming a fine bathing pool. A bath house has been erected for the accommodation of the bathers. The water is said to con-
