THE ELECTION.

TWO TICKETS IN THE FIELD—THE PEOPLE'S TICKET ELECTED.

Election Returns.

Agreeable to our expectations the official returns of Monday's election exceed the published figures of yesterday. The total of votes cast for Mayor was 1,829, of which Hon. James Sharp received 1,691, and the Liberal candidate, Major G. S. Erb, 131. The remaining 7 ballots were scattering.

The vote for Mayor, 1,829, represents the totality of ballots polled at the election.

Those "Moose."—A correspondent denigrating himself "A Danishman," writes from Big Cottonwood, asking us to correct the statement that it was a Danish man who killed the two donkeys in Parley's Canon, mistaking them for moose, as related in the News some time ago. Visitors.—Mr. W. H. Goodwine, of Goodwine, Illinois, close to the Indiana line, called in this morning, accompanied by Elder J. R. Marks and Brother J. R. Johnson, the latter lately from Johnsonville, Warren County, Indiana. Mr. Goodwine has been taking a tour to the Pacific Coast, going by way of the Southern Pacific and returning via the C.P. and U.P. He arrived night before last and leaves this evening. Brother Johnson, who came in October, is temporarily located in this city, but thinks of going north or south before long.

Married.—On Thursday, February 6th, in this city, the ceremony was performed by Counselor D. H. Wells, which united in the holy bonds of matrimony, Mr. Samuel L. Sheets and Miss Annie Weiler. The bridegroom is the son of Bishop E. F. Sheets, and the bride the daughter of Selectman E. M. Weiler, all of this city. A very pleasant reception was given at Brother Weiler's residence in the evening, where a merry company assembled to pay their respects to the young and happy pair, and congratulate them on the auspicious event of their union. The kind wishes of the News are none the less sincere because of this late expression of them.

Fort Douglas Opera House.

The Holland Comedy Company last evening formally opened the new and pretty theatre, to be known as the "McCook Opera House" of Fort Douglas. A very large audience was present. The production of "Our American Cousin" by this company can call forth nothing but praise, therefore it is useless to say that the soldiers enjoyed it fully.

General McCook deserves credit for the energy displayed in the erection of this pretty and cosy little theatre. It is nearly perfect in all its appointments, and will furnish amusement for the garrison which will probably be effectual in keeping those soldiers at home who are inclined to be troublesome when visiting the city and yielding to the allurements of saloons and other places of evil resort. Let us hope so at any rate.

Third District Court.

Proceedings before Chief Justice Hunter on Wednesday, February 13, 1884.

London Bank of Utah (L.) vs. W. H. H. Bowers; defendant's motion to strike out amended complaint argued and submitted.

B. G. Raymond vs. Frederick Lewis et al.; motion of defendant Lewis to vacate order made for writ of assistance and for injunction argued and refused.

Grand Jury return into court and present nine indictments, all found under the laws of the Territory of Utah.

People, etc., vs. D. B. Roche, charged with assault, etc.; charge ignored and dismissed.

People, etc., vs. Jesse James, charged with burglary; charge ignored and dismissed.

Julia Eastman vs. James P. Eastman; motion for a rehearing on motion for alimony and attorney's fees, argued.

The Iron Suits Ended.—The Beaver Record, of the 8th inst., has the following:

The District Court opened last Monday for the purpose of winding up the unfinished business of the December Term. It was thought that possibly the iron suits of Campbell, Cullen vs. Thos. Taylor would be resurrected at this resumed sitting; but the rumors current during December that a compromise was on the eve of consummation, proved to have had considerable foundation in fact. However, information is received here last Saturday that a final agreement had been arrived at last, and that the property in litigation would be divided up pro rata, taking into consideration, of course, the present state of development and consequent intrinsic valuation of the several claims.

It is understood, however, that Thos. Taylor has both the most in number and the richest of the claims in his possession, through prior and undisputed ownership. Thus ends what has been a very costly and comparatively fruitless case of litigation, and our district court will now, perforce, content itself with trying the few criminal cases that may come up before it, from the fact that the depressed state of business activity of almost every description, has apparently knocked all civil litigation in the head. This, however, is the lawyers' lament and not that of the ordinary citizen.

Holden News.

A correspondent from Holden, Millard County, writes under date of the 5th inst., as follows:

In a recent issue of the News, in some correspondence entitled "A Glimpse of Utah," by a traveler, I notice among other good things that the people of Scipio are finishing a new meeting house and the people of Holden are improving theirs. I wish to say that the people of Scipio are doing nothing at the meeting house, but they have built a commodious co-operative store which is about finished, and the people of Holden have built a new meeting house.

It was commenced October 3rd. It is 45 feet 6 inches in length, by 33 feet in width, with an 18 feet ceiling, and a tower which will be 56 feet high when finished. We have the roof on and floors in, and it is ready for plastering. We have sent to Salt Lake for lath and expect to keep at it until it is completed and dedicated. We also have a vestry attached to it, 13x18 feet, with an upper room. The front of the house has two Gothic windows and a door to match, with an inscribed tablet above the square in the gable end.

Our people feel happy in the hope and prospects they have of the future, are not at all discouraged at the efforts

of our enemies to hinder the work of God. We have excellent health and there is a great reformation going on in the midst of the people. Our stores do not sell a pound of tea a week and very little tobacco. We have no rum shop or other adjuncts of modern civilization in our town, and are happy, and feel to thank God for his mercies in the past, and hope to live to merit a continuance of them in the future. Our semi-weekly News comes to hand more regularly than for some weeks. It is always a welcome visitor.

PROGRAMME OF RECEPTION.

HOW OUR GUESTS FROM WYOMING ARE TO BE RECEIVED AND ENTERTAINED.

Last night the following programme for the reception and entertainment of the Wyoming Legislative party was formally adopted.

The committee of the Utah Legislature, with Gov. Murray, Secretary Thomas, Gen. McCook, D. Banks McKenzie, manager of the Walker Opera House, and the representatives of the press, will leave Salt Lake City at 7 o'clock this (Wednesday) morning, February 13th, 1884, and will meet the Wyoming party at the Territorial line.

Returning the party will be met at Ogden by prominent citizens, and greeted with music by the Ogden brass band, and at Salt Lake City, which will be reached by 3:30 o'clock, the Fort Douglas band will welcome the party. In the evening the members and officers of both Legislative Houses, the Mayor and Council of Salt Lake City, the civil and military authorities, and prominent citizens, will attend a concert in the Walker Opera House, tendered by D. Banks McKenzie, manager. During the evening addresses of welcome will be delivered by Gov. Murray, President Cluff, of the Council, and Speaker Sharp, of the House of Representatives.

On Thursday, the 14th, the Wyoming Legislative party will visit the Utah Legislature in session at 11 o'clock a. m. In the evening the Wyoming party, with the Mayor and Council of Salt Lake City, civil and military authorities and prominent citizens, will attend a performance at the Salt Lake Theatre, in company with and as the guests of the Utah Legislature. On Friday, the 15th, both the Legislative Assemblies, with other parties, will visit Fort Douglas, leaving the city at 1 o'clock p. m. Inconveniences provided for that purpose. In the evening the authorities of Salt Lake City will entertain both legislative parties, the civil and military authorities, and prominent citizens at the Salt Lake Theatre, at which time "The Life of an Actress" will be presented by the Home Dramatic Club.

The fact of the party not reaching here till 7:30 o'clock this evening will probably break into to-night's part of the programme. The arrangement for Friday night, as stated elsewhere, has been changed, a grand ball being substituted for the proposed dramatic performance.

Provo City Election.—The municipal election in Provo on Monday passed off peaceably. There was only about 20 per cent. polled of the registered number of voters. The cold and stormy weather, together with the fact that no "Liberal" opposition ticket was in the field, had the effect to keep hundreds of voters from the polls. There was, however, a trick perpetrated that deserves the condemnation of every consistent and loyal member of the People's Party. Early in the day some "nigger in the fence" succeeded in getting possession of from one hundred to two hundred of the People's tickets, and, having scratched off one of the names, inserted in its place the name of another gentleman; then, to escape detection and mislead voters, mixed the defaced tickets among the straight ones.

The trick was soon discovered, however, and the scratched tickets were separated and placed on another part of the table. This proceeding was a violation of the principles of the People's Party, and it is hoped that the guilty person has no connection with it. The People's convention unanimously adopted the ticket as printed and if any voter was not satisfied with it, he could have voted just as he himself chose to do, but to deface other tickets and seek to impose them on the members of his party is a piece of deception that savors strongly of treachery.

Caledonia Society.

A largely attended meeting was held in Calder's new Music Hall, on last Saturday evening, which resulted in the organization of a society of Latter-day Saints, having for its leading objects the encouragement of mental improvement, social enjoyment, healthful recreation and mutual benefit. It is intended to inaugurate as soon as practicable, social meetings, embracing instructive literary, and musical entertainment.

It is also designed to establish a library, and, if the Society becomes sufficiently large and prosperous, the erection of a reading room, and hall for lectures and amusements, is contemplated. Recreations of a proper and healthful kind will be occasionally indulged in, when the weather favors out-of-door exercises. The families of members who die will be entitled to assistance.

These, in brief, are some of the purposes of the Society, as evinced by the rules and regulations submitted to, and adopted by the meeting on Saturday evening.
