

STATE TEACHERS MUST KNOW MORE

Increased Requirements Decided
Upon by State Board of
Education.

QUALIFY IN COLLEGE WORK.

High School Diplomas to be Issued
Hereafter on Better Showing in
Higher Branches.

The state board of education adopted a resolution yesterday at its regular meeting held in the office of A. C. Nelson, state superintendent, increasing the requirements of applicants for state certificates of high schools and grammar grades. The qualifications have been confined to work in prescribed subjects, but hereafter part of this work must be in college courses as well as in the high school grade. The college work, it is held, is much more thorough than the high school work. The resolution is as follows:

"Be it resolved by the state board of education that on and after Oct. 1, 1909:

"First, All applicants for a five-year state certificate must have had four years of high school grade, and in addition thereto must present acceptable credits in psychology and history of education. The high school work must include English, three years' work; elementary algebra, elementary geometry, government, botany and physical geography.

"Second, Applicants for a life diploma of grammar grade must present credits covering five years' work, one year of which must be college grade and the other four years of high school grade. The credits presented must include the subjects required by law, namely, arithmetic, United States history, reading and elocution, orthography, English grammar, political and physical geography, physics, nature studies, algebra, physiology, rhetoric, drawing, plane and solid geometry, botany, English literature, general history, civil government, history and science of education and psychology. If enough work has not been done in these subjects to make the required amount of five years, then substitution will be allowed.

"Third, Applicants for a life diploma of high school grade must present credits covering seven years' work, three years of which must be of college grade and the four years of high school grade. The credits presented must include the subjects required by law, namely, arithmetic, United States history, reading and elocution, orthography, English grammar, political and physical geography, physics, algebra, geometry, botany, English literature, general history, civil government, history and science of education and psychology, and also work in any three of the following branches, namely, chemistry, geology, French, German, Latin, Greek, trigonometry, zoology, biology, and military science. If the work done in these subjects does not complete seven years of work, then substitution of work in college grade will be allowed. The board passed on a number of applications yesterday for diplomas of various grades. As soon as the list is prepared it will be announced.

DESPONDENT FINN A SUICIDE.

John Ingo Kills Himself in Bingham Because of Illness.

Wearied of life and despondent from a long period of ill health, John Ingo, a Finn, aged 35 years, yesterday committed suicide near the Dalstrom boardinghouse in Carr Fork, choosing a revolver as the means of self-destruction.

The suicide was discovered yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock by W. E. Pennington, an employee of the Bell Telephone company, who came upon the body lying upon an embankment in the rear of the boardinghouse.

It is presumed that Ingo took his life about 11 o'clock yesterday forenoon. At that time a shot was heard by the inmates of the boardinghouse, but no thought was given it. It appears that Ingo had come into the boardinghouse, a fellow-boarder and secured the latter's revolver and then walked out to the ground, which he had selected as his death-place. He had placed the muzzle of the revolver between his teeth and sent the bullet crashing through the roof of the mouth and into the base of the brain. Death was instantaneous. Ingo was a single man and so far as known had no relatives in this country. He was a member of the Western Federation of Miners, and had resided in the vicinity of Bingham for the past six years. The funeral will be held Saturday noon from the Swedish Lutheran church at Bingham under the direction of the Bingham lodge of the Western Federation of Miners.

THE BLUFF THAT FAILED.

Clyde Tuttle Is Spanked After Feigning Suicide.

The efforts of Clyde Tuttle, aged 16 years, residing in the Tuttle court, on Fourth North, to bluff his parents into remission for their parental chastisement of him, acted as a sort of boomerang, resulting in his not only getting sick but a further liberal use of the rod. The youth, who is said to be an incorrigible, conceived the idea of scaring his parents with the bluff of having taken poison. He secured a two ounce vial of laudanum and after taking a few drops, stretched himself upon the lounge at his home and called to a neighbor. When the youth told the neighbor he had taken laudanum, the latter promptly notified the police who hurried to the home. The bluff was then revealed and when the parents took in the situation, the youth was administered and the case closed.

RAISING FUNDS FOR CADETS.

Subscriptions from One Dollar Up Are Requested.

Of the \$12,000 necessary to send the high school cadets to the exposition at Seattle, \$8,000 has been raised. Of this amount D. C. Jackling has contributed \$3,000. The boys, 25 in number, are holding daily drills so that they will be in shape for creditable appearance on the drill grounds at the exposition. The matter of securing the balance necessary has been opened up to the public, and any amount, from \$1 up will be gratefully received by the committee. Gov. Sperry is chairman of the committee.

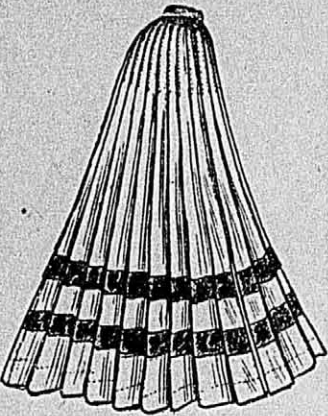
