

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**THEATRICAL.**—The splendid romantic spectacle of the "Naïad Queen" will be produced for the first time to-morrow evening with new and gorgeous scenery, by Messrs Methuen and Lamborne, choruses and songs, new costumes, new properties, and an excellent cast. In order to obtain a full rehearsal with all the Naïads, Amazons and the rest of the cast, the Theatre will be closed this evening. To-morrow evening we shall be transported to the shores of the romantic Rhine, with its towering castles and vine-clad hills, as also to its mighty deep where Lurline, the "Naïad Queen," holds her court and holds undiminished sway in her watery empire. Madame Scheller will appear as the Naïad Queen, Mr. Hardie as the Knight "Sir Fearnaught," Mr. Margolis as "Schampy," a character which gives the comedian scope for all kinds of eccentricities, and Mr. Graham as "Amphibia," the Queen's faithful attendant and business manager. The rest of the characters are well distributed. We shall have more of this gorgeous spectacle to-morrow, for the present suffice it to say that we are promised an unsurpassed entertainment. Let everybody secure seats early. The "Naïad Queen" is one of the most dazzling and amusing scenic spectacles ever been produced on any stage. **A DOWNWARD BLAST.**—We met our genial bachelor friend, W. P. Nebeker, yesterday evening, who is enthusiastic in every good work, except matrimony, sorry as we are to chronicle the latter fact. He opened up a new vision of thought with regard to railroading, in reporting the progress of the work on the contract of John W. Young, Esq., some four miles south of Ogden. A blast of blast had been put in the hard earth, and huge masses thrown up, under the direction of General W. S. Snow, with whom the Indians around Sanpete have been acquainted in a recent past. Not satisfied with the success of ordinary blasts, one was prepared deeper than any of its fellows, and containing a much larger amount of powder than usual. **ECHO CITY.**—Our regular dispatch from Echo City reports matters moving along with a fair show for law and order prevailing through the winter term. There are some nice specimens of American citizens there, as well as the genus *homo*, who contrive to live by whisky-peddling, and yet don't have enough to pay a moderate fine when assessed, for a license is a relic of barbarism in which they do not believe. A little gambling, a good deal of whisky walking around, big looks with muttered imprecations about being "ruled by Mormons," and an earnest desire strongly expressed to "run the machine" after the most approved method of the "civilization" which prevails in railroad towns, are the leading characteristics of Echo city at present. Justice Livingston keeps moving along quietly but determinedly. We wish him success in his efforts to have the laws respected and peace reign. In almost every civilized country gamblers are theoretically under the ban of the laws they have broken; in this Territory we wish to see the law enforced and respected.

LEGISLATIVE.

**COUNCIL.**—The sum of three hundred dollars was ordered to be inserted in the general appropriation bill for the relief of Walter Jones, who was wounded while in service against the Indians in Sanpete county. A petition from the Mayor and Citizens of Salt Lake City for an appropriation for the erection of a Hospital was presented and read, and was referred to a Committee of the whole. A statement from Hon. A. P. Rockwood, Warden of the Penitentiary, suggesting the passage of an act to regulate the labor of convicts sentenced to the Penitentiary was presented, read, and referred to the Committee on the Penitentiary. (H. F. No. 7.) An act prescribing rules and regulations for the execution of the trust arising out of Congress, entitled "An act for the relief of the inhabitants of cities and towns upon the public lands," approved March 2nd, 1897, was taken up on its second reading, pending which, the Council took a recess.

**COUNCIL.**—Mr. Johnson presented (C. F. No. 8.) An act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific or literary associations, which was read and laid on the table to come up in its order. Mr. Woodruff, Chairman of the Committee on Agriculture, Trade and Manufactures, to whom was referred (H. F. No. 9.) An act pertaining to sheep, reported the same back amended, and recommended its passage. It was read as amended and laid on the table to come up in its order. On motion of Mr. Smoot, the Council went into committee of the whole, to consider the petition of the Mayor and citizens of Salt Lake City for an appropriation for the erection of a Hospital. Mr. Harrington moved that the committee report a recommendation to grant \$10,-

000 on said petition, and recommend the appointment of a special committee, to act with a like committee of the House to draft a bill for an act to carry out the object of the petitioners. **HOUSE.**—House met at ten a.m. The financial report of Tooele county was read and referred to the committee on Revenue. The committee on Penitentiary reported that they had carefully examined the reports and accounts of the Penitentiary and were well satisfied with the manner in which it was conducted. They recommended the sum of \$850.00 to be appropriated for convict labor; \$406.04 for repairs on Penitentiary; \$2,000.00 for current expenses, and \$1,200.00 for Warden's salary for 1898. The committee on memorials were instructed to memorialize Congress that the Internal Revenue derived from this Territory for the next ensuing three years might be appropriated for the purpose of improving or rebuilding the Penitentiary. A bill for an act defining the duties of the Territorial county and municipal officers having the management and expenditure of public funds, was read; referred to the committee on the Judiciary, and 100 copies ordered printed. A bill for an act to limit the time within which civil actions may be sustained in the Territorial county and municipal officers having the management and expenditure of public funds, was read; referred to the committee on the Judiciary, and 100 copies ordered printed. Adjourned till to-morrow at 10 a. m.
