COUNCIL.-The sum of three hundred dollars was ordered to be inserted in the general appropriation bill for the relief of Walter Jones, who was wounded while in service against the Indians in Sanpete county.

A petition from the Mayer and Citizens

of Salt Lake City for an appropriation for the erection of an Hospital was presented and read, and was referred to a Committee of the whole.

A statement from Hon, A. P. Rockwood Warden of the Penitentiary, suggesting the passage of an act to regulate the labor of convicts sentenced to the Penitentiary was presented, read, and referred to the Committee on the Penitentiary.

(H. F. No. 7,) An act prescribing rules and regulations for the execution of the trust arising under an act rf Congress, en-titled "An act for the relief of the inhabitants of cities and towns lands," approved March 2nd, 1867, was taken up on its second reading, pending which, the Council took a recess.

Wednesday, Jan. 27th. COUNCIL .- Mr. Johnson presented (C. F. No.8,) An act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific or literary asso-

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
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
