At the former, scenes typical of the life of the pioneers will be reproduced, while at the latter the Eagle band of Pocatello will discourse its melodies, a bower will be erected for luncheon, oratory, etc. Altogether, either celebration will be calculated to furnish ample reward for the trouble attendant upon getting there.

The events of the day are under the direction of the Sunday school board of the Pocatello stake.

JUNCTION CITY NOTES.
State Bank Examiner Liggett is spending a few days in looking over the situation here.

The weather continues dry and sultry, with scarcely any wind, and no indications of immediate change.

"Jimbo" Dwyer, the veteran bookman of Salt Lake, was in town today, and reports business as being very satisfactory.

Mrs. Arthur Williams left last night for Salt Lake to visit her husband who is laid up in the hospital undergoing treatment for a catarrh of the eye.

J. H. Townsend and Mrs. Geo. Reeves charged with failing to shut off their water at the sounding of the fire alarm, were fined \$3 each in Police Judge Knowles court today.

Major Caldwell is in receipt of an order from Cheyenne, Wyoming, for 20 bunks, 10 squares and several purposes, to assist in the frontier celebration at that place. The major has taken the matter up with headquarters at Washington.

The remains of the colored man Hall, who was shot and killed by Jim Thompson, another colored man, in a dining hall at the hotel here Tuesday afternoon, were shipped to Ogden today for burial. Thompson now has the temerity to make public a statement pleading justification for his coldblooded act, and seeking to establish a plea of self-defense.

Mrs. Rose Farnum was this afternoon acquitted in Judge White's court of the charge brought against her by Robert Quayle, of using a vile epithet and drawing a gun on him with intent to do him bodily harm. The trouble arose over Quayle packing his belongings and not paying for his board here, and she tried to clear out. The evidence showed that Mrs. Farnum drew the gun and collected the board bill, but that she did not use any bad language.

HIGH ANGLE FIRING BY THE JAPANESE.
The cut illustrates the manner in which the Russian troops were dislodged from their places of refuge during the retreat from Mukden. For the first time in the present campaign the Japanese obtained excellent results from their high angle "canet" guns. When the Russians camped for the night they selected positions which



were protected from the enemy by high hills. By means of these canet guns the Japanese were enabled to send projectiles over the tops of the hills and to land them in the enemy's camp. The canet discouraged soldiers were unused to this species of artillery fire and could only pull up stakes and resume their flight.

COPPER DISCOVERY.
A very rich discovery of copper is reported to have been made recently in the department of Yoro, Honduras. Those who have examined it state that the amount of ore is very large and very rich, running from 15 to 60 per cent copper. The discoverers have located eight well defined veins, which can be traced for miles on the surface, two of these being twelve feet wide, one ten feet and one fourteen feet. It is estimated that the entire body will average 50 per cent copper.

IDAHO DAY AT PORTLAND FAIR.
Citizens of Gem State Making Great Preparations for the Big Event.
BIG PROGRAM OF EXERCISES.
Arrangements Made to Have an Ample Fruit Display from This Time On.

BOISE, Idaho, July 14.—If the plans at present contemplated are carried out Idaho day, on Sept. 7, at the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland, will be an occasion never to be forgotten by the citizens of Idaho who are present, as well as by the visitors to the exposition on that day. It is hoped that the railroad companies can be induced to give a round trip rate of considerably less than that in the event that it can be shown that a large number will go from each of the principal points of the state. In this way it is believed that several thousand Idaho citizens would visit Portland at that time, and that the state would get the benefit of the advertising that the presence of so large a number of prosperous people from an interior state on one day would create.

PIONEERS TO BE PRESENT.
The present intention is to have a program of exercises on that day, that will in a measure be an attraction in itself. The pioneers will be present in numbers, and all will be given a prominent place on the program. Some attempt will be made to tell those witnessing the exercises how the Gem of the Mountains was developed within 30 years from a mountain fastness to its present condition of prosperous growth.

STATE BAND.
Among the features that it is hoped to show in Portland on Idaho day is a representative Idaho state band of 75 pieces, the performers all being citizens of the state. Prof. Brady of Caldwell, who has the organization of the band in charge, states that he is receiving encouragement from all portions of the state, and that the prospect for its successful organization now seems very bright.

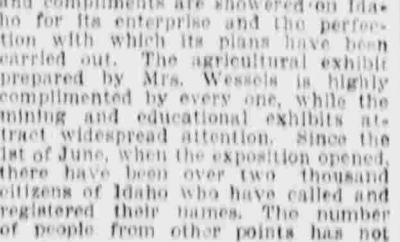
IDAHO STATE BUILDING.

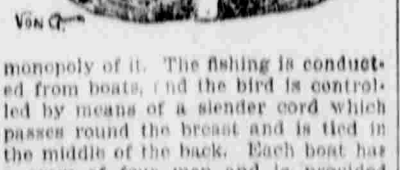
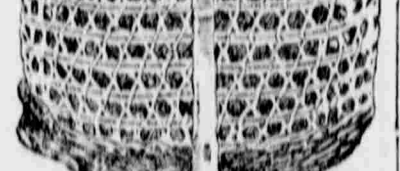

STATE BONDS SIGNED.
State bonds authorized by the last session of the legislature, to the aggregate amount of \$10,000, have been signed by Gov. Gooding, Secy. of State Gibson and Treasurer Coffin, and as soon as they have been registered by the state auditor, will be forwarded to the purchasers, McDonald & McCoy, in Chicago, and the purchase money, about \$125,000, be returned here.

State Treasurer Coffin has written to all of the banks which were recently declared state depositories, asking them to increase the amount of their bonds, so that the state's deposits might be increased. It is expected that banks in the agricultural counties of the state will be particularly anxious to receive this money, as there is an enormous grain, hay and fruit crop to handle, which will require a large amount of money within the next three or four months.
