LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lactical Fluid "O. K."—Twenty-four samples of milk were tested yesterday, by the city chemist and found up to the standard.

A. J. Weber to Orate—A. J. Weber will be the principal speaker at tomorrow evening's Meyer-Hayward meeting to be held in Federation hall.

"Guests" of the Warden—At last reports there were 227 convicts in the state prison. The warden says this increase is due to the natural increase in population.

Roofing Is Now Completed—Silver Bros. has completed the roofing and general enclosing of their new iron plant, and will begin casting work about the middle of March.

Luxuries For Goldfield—Frank Davidson and I. H. Lewis have gone to Goldfield with two hacks and eight horses to engage in the hack business there.

Construction Starts—Active construction work has begun on the Utah Nevada & Idaho Telephone Company's lines, both at the Ely, Nev., and at the Salt Lake ends.

\$25 Reward—Hoodlums have been breaking in lamp globes lately on First and Second streets between A and G streets, and the Utah Light and Railway offers \$25 reward for their arrest.

Card Party—The Woman's Republican club will give a card party on Wednesday evening, Feb. 20, at 8 p. m., at the Federation of Labor hall. Prizes will be given the winners and refreshments will be served.

Where Is Thomas Winch?—Postmaster Thomas has received a letter from Ambrose Winch of Littlebourne, Kent, England, inquiring after the whereabouts of his brother, Thomas who came to Utah six years ago.

At Fort Douglas—Sergt. Maj. Wells of the Twentieth Infantry has returned from Hot Springs, Ark., where he went for treatment. Sergt. George H. Huddleston of H company has passed his examination for promotion to a second lieutenant.

Light Court Martial—It is expected that the light court martial at Fort Douglas will close Monday afternoon. The court has finally concluded to order the accused to give up his side arms, but he is not confined to quarters.

Merely Will Be Shown—Invitations to the Credit Men's banquet Monday night contain the following reassuring statement: "While this morning's evening clothes will not be lynched, they will be much safer if they come clad in every-day apparel."

Public Pays the Fiddler—The Bell telephone management states that if the wages of operatives in Montana are to be raised, it will be necessary to raise the rates to correspond, as the company is not in business purely for its health.

Second Call Was a Haise—Rev. Mr. Wynne, the Butte Presbyterian minister who was called to the Westminster church in this city, and was expected to deliver his first sermon at the Salt Lake church by deciding to remain where he is, as his congregation has made it an object for him to do so.

Greek Robbed—Gus Sarukos, a Greek, was knocked down and robbed of \$2 about 2 o'clock this morning by two men. One of the alleged robbers was captured by Officer Staines and backed up in the city jail. He gave the name of George Daugherty. About an hour later a man named Charles Hall was arrested as an accomplice of the other man.

ARMY OFFICERS SQUARES LADIES

Strange Conduct of Capt. Brooks At Ft. Douglas Who Stopped Newhouse Auto.

HE FLOURISHED A REVOLVER.

In the Motor Car Were an Aged Lady, An Invalid and Mrs. Samuel Newhouse.

Capt. A. S. Brooks of Fort Douglas is charged with conduct very unbecoming an officer and a gentleman, and that he will be called upon to account for his alleged reprehensible actions beyond a question of doubt.

The occurrence took place about 4 p. m., and was wholly unexpected and unwarranted. The car was being driven at a very slow rate of speed and had just entered the grounds, when Capt. Brooks rushed out and commanded the driver to stop. The request was immediately complied with, and then, it is alleged, the late officer opened the car door and flourished the weapon in the faces of the ladies.

The story of the outrage is explicitly told in a letter written by Mr. Newhouse of Col. Lockwood, at the latter's request, which reads as follows: "As suggested by you, I now make complaint against Capt. Brooks of the United States army, stationed at Fort Douglas, yesterday afternoon, about 4 o'clock, Mrs. Newhouse with a party of friends entered the grounds of your post in an automobile. The party consisted, besides Mrs. Newhouse, of her mother, Mrs. Stingley, her sister, Mrs. George C. Moore, and Mrs. Lawrence Townsend and her daughter, Miss Townsend, besides Bert Fuller, the chauffeur.

"Mrs. Stingley is a lady 75 years old, very nervous and excitable. Miss Townsend, who with her mother, has lately arrived in the city, has just recovered from a long illness, and on account of her condition and the age of the chauffeur, Mrs. Newhouse gave to the chauffeur special instructions to drive at a very low rate of speed. When the automobile entered the gateway it was moving at a rate not exceeding five miles an hour. When the party reached a point almost opposite the first house on the enclosure, Capt. Brooks rapidly approached from the left-hand side, and, holding his hand to his forehead, indicated that he wished him to stop. The chauffeur stopped immediately, and Capt. Brooks then in an angry manner drew his revolver and leveled it at the head of the chauffeur, pointing at him in a loud and angry voice repeated several times, 'Get out. Get out. I tell you!'

"Miss Townsend was sitting on the front seat with the chauffeur, and was greatly frightened. Capt. Brooks turned the point of his revolver to those inside the automobile and within a few inches of Mrs. Stingley's face, and then to those of Mrs. Newhouse, who was seated beside the automobile, shouting in a loud and angry tone, 'Get out, get out!'

"The chauffeur was backing the machine so as to turn it towards the entrance. The car was then ordered to turn with out backing. While the machine was turning, Mrs. Newhouse called to the chauffeur to stop, and immediately alighted. Mrs. Moore also sprang out and, with the assistance of Miss Townsend, who was in a precarious condition on account of recent illness, she was helped to alight.

"By this time Capt. Brooks was moving away, with the revolver still in his hand. Mrs. Newhouse approached him and asked what he meant by treating a party of defenseless women in that manner. How had they offended? He replied in an indignant tone, 'You allowed me to drive this morning.' While this conversation was going on, Miss Stingley was in hysterics, crying out, 'That madman will kill my daughter! She was with me!'

"Mrs. Newhouse was trying to calm Mrs. Stingley, while Mrs. Moore was taking care of Miss Townsend. Capt. Woodward then drove away, stopping at the first house on the way to the enclosure, to obtain some water for the purpose of reviving Mrs. Stingley and Miss Townsend.

"These ladies have suffered, and are still suffering, very much from the consequence of this assault. Dr. Beatty was called at once to attend Miss Townsend, who is seriously ill from the effect of this experience. I have a full and signed this story from the women of the party and the chauffeur, and have endeavored to set forth a plain and unimpassioned recital of the facts, so that you may take any action upon the case as you may deem best. Upon the advice of the United States district attorney I submit the matter to you in the first instance, as I am advised that by the proper course of action, my complaint I will offer the statement of all the parties, who will appear before you in person."

CASE WILL BE INVESTIGATED. Mr. Newhouse was very indignant at the treatment accorded Mrs. Newhouse and her guests, as was also Mr. Townsend, husband and father of two of the ladies. That the matter shall be thoroughly investigated and the proper punishment meted out is the determination of both gentlemen. Her father, Lawrence Townsend, is a business partner of Mr. Newhouse, and was formerly United States minister to Belgium.

HIS ARMY RECORD. Capt. Albert Brooks, is "a gentleman from Arkansas," which may explain the readiness with which he reached for his gun in a defiant, or supposed, of the anatomical integrity of his dog. He graduated from the military academy in 1895, when he was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Eighteenth Infantry and was stationed at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Tex. He was made captain in the Thirtieth Infantry in February, 1901, and transferred to the Twenty-ninth the following April. Brooks served as commissary during the Spanish war. He is in command here of a company of his regiment.
