## SOME IMPORTANT UHANGES.

#### Simon Bamberger Secures Railway's Franchise-New Team Coming.

The result of the meeting of the In-termountain league officials held Saturday night, has created no surprise. On Satur day evening before the meeting, Mr "lippinger stated to a "News" man that the only matter to be settled, so far as he was concerned was the price. "I have set the price," said he, "and if they come up with the money that's all

The price Mr. Bamberger pays for the

franchise is \$1,000, deducting \$250 forfeit, which gives Clippinger \$750, Before June 17th Mr. Bamberger will have to put in his club, and the team will be known as the Lagoon team and will play out the original schedule of dates for the Rallways with the dif-ference that some of the contests will take place at Lagoon. The matter of arranging those details will be attended to by the managers of the various teams in the near future. Mr. Bamberger has purchased the franchise and not the team, so that the Railways are practically no more. If present plans are carried out the new team will be a cracker Jack in every particular. It is not improbable that one or two of the Railways will be retained, but the team will be made up mostly of players Harry Stoney is to bring here this week from Denver. It is said that the team will be made up with the following well known players in it:

"Buck" Weaver, captain and first use, Newmeyer, Kostal, Ewing and "Sleepy" Simmons, pitchers: Cotton or Stoney, second base; John Green, shortstop: Logue or McNichols, third base; Radeliffe and Bradley, outfielders. In any event Mr. Bamberger has ex-
