

THE NEXT SHOT FIRED

The Industrialists Show Case Before Judge Merrill Today.

AN ARMY OF LEGAL TALENT.

LAWYER RHODES AND ARTHUR BROWN
A Few of them—Argonauts
of Counsel.

The hearing on the restraining order and order to show cause issued yesterday afternoon, under the direction of Chief Justice Merrill, in regard to the health claimant of the Industrializing now held by officers of the parties of Davis county, began at 2 o'clock this afternoon, in the Third circuit court, before Judge Merrill.

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The great interest taken in the proceedings was made manifest by the very large attendance of spectators, all located in the rear of the court room being occupied. A number of others, located in front, witnessed, conducted, and directed the legal arguments.

The party of the plaintiff, which was "present" by court order, a few of whom were within the bar.

Upon taking the bench, Judge Merrill announced that there were no way or means of ascertaining of apportioned or distributed on the part of the audience, as was the case yesterday, he should easily have the court cleared.
