LOCAL BRIEFS.

New Registry Clerk—Miss Eva F. Hamlin has been appointed clerk in the Salt Lake post office, succeeding William Simpson, resigned.

To Hold Memorial Service—The Ladies Auxiliary of the O. R. C. will hold memorial services in the McIntosh block next Sunday at 4 p. m. John P. Meakin will deliver an address.

Horizontal Examinations—There will be an examination Saturday at the Chamber of Commerce for the positions of horticultural inspector and deputy for the counties of Salt Lake, Utah, Tooele, Weber, and Boxelder.

Prize List Growing—Walker Bros. have donated a \$200 gown as one of the prizes for real estate day in place of the previous gown donated and which was sold by mistake by a clerk prior to delivery to the real estate men. The list of prizes includes already 375 articles.

Odell's Leave Italy—George T. Odell, inst. expecting to be in Havre on the 23rd inst. He has exchanged transportation so that the party will sail from Liverpool on the Campania, Aug. 31, thereby extending their trip 10 days.

Open Season For Grass Fires—Two grass fires, the first on Third avenue between A and B streets, and the other at Thirtieth and Second, were started by the fire department, a couple of hours' work yesterday afternoon to prevent the spreading of the flames to nearby residences. The fires were supposed to have been started by boys playing with matches.

Capt. Ham to Salt—Capt. S. V. Ham, stationed in this city as quartermaster in charge of the reconstruction work at Fort Douglas a few years ago, is now commanding a company in the Twelfth regiment, and will sail with his regiment for Manila in two weeks from San Francisco. He was transferred from the Fifth infantry at the completion of his staff detail a few months ago. The twelfth is divided up between Governor's Island, Fort Porter and Fort Niagara.

Names Precedent Wardens—Fred W. Chambers, field game commissioner, appointed seven special precinct deputy wardens yesterday. Six of the appointments were made for Millard county, and the seventh for Boxelder county. They will serve without pay except the commission they receive from selling licenses and they are entitled to have the fines imposed in cases of convictions made by them, for violations of the fish and game laws.

BUTCHERS AND GROCERS HAPPY

They Shut Up Shop Long Enough For the Annual Barbecue.

BABY SHOW IN THE EVENING.

Edna May Clough Captures First Prize By Her Winning Ways—Nobody Went Away Hungry.

Sizzling, juicy beef, hot off the spit, healthy slices of fresh bread neatly wrapped in sandwich style and accompanied by a big dish of pickle, was the portion handed to each of the 9,000 visitors at the annual outing of the Salt Lake butchers and grocers at Saltair yesterday. The butchers and the grocers were on deck early at the resort. Good management was in evidence from the start. A dozen committees, selected for their knowledge of conditions and ability to do things right, had charge of the different departments of the barbecue. All visitors were greeted and invited to step up to the "pie counter" and get a piece of beef. And to see that nobody got away from the resort without an invitation to eat, a "hungry" committee, composed of E. C. Allen, Fred Walte, Bert Olson and F. W. Wilson, secured the big pavilion and corners thereof for people who had missed the barbecue.

Not a single donation was asked by the butchers and grocers. What the left cost was contributed to the rank of the association. Some idea of what was required to feed the crowds may be had when it is stated that 12,000 loaves of bread, 10 hams, and two barrels of fat pickles were consumed during the day. At times there were 200 people in the line waiting their turn to be served, but each one got a sandwich and all who wished got two or three.

UNFORTUNATE REMEMBERED. The day was one long to be remembered and remembered with a kindly feeling toward the butchers and grocers. The leading spirit of the affair was "Passy" Price, who had charge of the barbecue. Thomas Davis, assisted by a committee of five, purchased the meats, and Bert Milam, Bert Olson and F. W. Wilson bought the other odds. Patent slicing machines were used in cutting the bread and meat, and sandwiches were turned out at a very rapid rate. The barbecue lasted from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon, and was taken up again at 6 o'clock in the evening, in order to give the workers a rest, and to accommodate late comers at the resort.

There was a great deal of bread and meat left. This was all in good condition and was taken to the Salvation Army by Byron Blackburn for distribution among the poor of the city today. The barbecue was only one feature of the day. There was a lot of baby show. There were prizes of \$5 each given for the prettiest and heaviest babies, and \$250 for the next prettiest and heaviest infants. Hundreds of babies with big, rosy cheeks were at the resort, and the competition was lively and the committee had hard work to decide which one should take the prize. The baby show was in charge of Fred Walte and the committee of judges was composed of Benjamin H. Hollingsworth, Will L. Price and Geo. B. Margrett.
