**CHILD SCALDED TO DEATH.**

L. J. Naphier Held to District Court for Obtaining Money by Fraud.

High School Gives Classical Examination—Civil Service Examination—Briefs and Personalities.

A sad accident occurred at Carlin, Nevada, Thursday evening resulting in the death of the little 2-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Whitley. The little child was playing around the house and by some means fell into a tub of hot water, terribly scalding the body. The parents were unable to get necessary medical aid at the time and came to Ogden early yesterday morning. Dr. R. S. Lowe rendered every possible assistance but the wounds were too severe. The pain which the little child was suffering was great and she passed peacefully in the great beyond about 12-year-old boy.

To make Mr. Whitley's trouble much more sad and hard to bear, her 16-year-old brother, Grant Steele, son of Constable Henry Steele, of the Fourth ward, died also yesterday afternoon of diphtheria at the family residence on east Twenty-first street. The brother was laid peacefully away the funeral being private on account of the disease which cut his life off.

MUST ANSWER IN COURT.

L. J. Naphier who was arrested at Casper, Wyo., on the charge of obtaining money under false pretense from Everett Brothers of the city, was given a preliminary hearing before Justice H. L. Miller yesterday afternoon on the charge. The witnesses against him were Dr. F. Critchlow of the Consolidated Wagon and Machine Company, and John and William Everett. Mr. Critchlow testified that Naphier bought a single buggy from the wagon company giving therefor his note on contract that he did not pay for the same but took it and sold it to Everett

and the note was paid.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION.

On May 2, 1903, the United States civil service commission announces an

examination will be held in this city for carriers and clerks in the Ogden postoffice.
