AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance providing for the rebating and refunding of special or local taxes in excess of the actual cost of the improvement, and for the collection of such taxes as are levied.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah:

Section 1. The City Engineer shall report to the City Council the actual cost of such improvement, to defray which a special or local tax has been levied, and shall also show the difference, if any, between the actual cost and the tax levied thereon for such improvement.

Section 2. The City Treasurer, immediately upon the receipt of the report mentioned in the foregoing section, shall report to the City Council a list of all persons who have paid into the City Treasurer any portion of such special or local taxes, which may be in excess of the actual cost of the portion of such improvement.

Section 3. The City Treasurer, immediately upon the receipt of the report mentioned in Section 2, shall proceed to examine the same. He shall determine what persons are justly entitled to a refund of any portion of such taxes, and the amount to which each person is entitled. He shall audit such claims in the same manner as he audits the claims of persons who have paid into the City Treasurer any portion of such special or local taxes, and which has been assessed for such improvement, and the amount of tax assessed against each person.

Section 4. The City Auditor, immediately upon the receipt of the report mentioned in Section 3, shall proceed to examine the same. He shall determine what persons are justly entitled to a refund of any portion of such taxes, and the amount to which each person is entitled. He shall audit such claims in the same manner as he audits the claims of persons who have paid into the City Treasurer any portion of such special or local taxes, and which has been assessed for such improvement, and the amount of tax assessed against each person.

Section 5. The City Council, upon the report of the City Auditor, shall determine what persons are justly entitled to a refund of any portion of such taxes, and the amount to which each person is entitled. It shall then proceed to refund such taxes, and the amount to which each person is entitled.
