MUST CONDUCT **ELECTIONS FAIRLY**

Prest. Roosevelt and Secy. Taft Have Notified Panama Government to That Effect.

THEIR LANGUAGE IS PLAIN.

No Attempt at Fraud Will be Tolerated -Preparations for Intervention, if Necessary, Are Going On.

Washington, June 11.-In language that cannot be mistaken, the president and Secy. Taft have notified the Panama government that elections in that republic must be conducted fairly,

that republic must be conducted fairly. The circumstances attending this warning were given out for publication as if in preparation for active intervention on the part of the United States by the use of whatever force shall be necessary to make it effective. Secy. Taft, in a letter delivered to President Amador in person and dated May 12, suggests that two years ago, when charges of fraud were made concerning the congressional election at Panama, it was not thought best to do more than to urge fairness in the do more than to urge fairness in administration of election laws.

TAFT TO AMADOR.

Jome very weighty evidence was adduced," he continues, "to show that there were many who had been de-prived of their constitutional right to vote in that election, and there was much evidence of violence and repeat-ing by the police in the cities of Pan-ama, Colon and elsewhere. No active Intervention, however, was attempted by the United States government. It was hoped that the irregularities of

the last election were due merely to the fact that the election laws were new, the republic was young, and that at a more important election like the presidential election to follow, greater care would be taken to preserve the rights of the citizens.

"The interest of the United States in the fairness of the elections of the republic is manifest. The United States guarantees the integrity of the republic, and this involves a recognition by it of the lawful government. If fraud is to intervene in the election so that a dispute arises as to who are the lawfully elected authorities, then it becomes necessary for the United States in the discharge of its treaty and consitutional duty, to determine who are the lawfully elected officers, in order that it may recognize them and deal with them as such. The United States cannot look upon any election which is not conducted on fair lines and is likely to lead to violence, with anything but the utmost concern, and it has a direct interest in case of threatened fraud in an election to Interfere to prevent it, and in case the fraud is carried out to intervene to prevent the succession of those officials in whose election there was not the free choice. election there was not the free choice of the people.

RELUCTANT TO INTERVENE.

"It goes without saying," he addmost refluctant to intervene in the in-ternal affairs of the republic of Pan-ama, but for the reasons I have given, should the occasion arise, I do not see now it can be avoided. I venture to suggest to your excellency, therefore,

The first answer to this communication received by Mr. Taft from President Amador as a denial of any fraudulent election and a refusal to take any of the steps suggested. Subsequently an agreement was reached between the Panaman authorities and the American minister and Commissioners Goethals and Blackburn, together with the general counsel of the commission, Mr. Rogers, by which Panama agreed to create a commission of electoral inquiry to investigate the complaints of all parties, and under which the United States was to join in the inquiry through any persons appointed by it.

Three governors known to be in favor of Obaldia, the opponent of Secy, Arias, were recently removed from office by President Amador, because, as he informed Mr. Blackburn, he did not propose to have anybody in office opposed to the government. The other four governors are Arias men. At the same time, the government has decreased by it the electoral votes which under the law, may be cast by Colon for the president, Colon being understood to be an Obaldia district, and insaincreased by five the electoral representation from the province of Los Santos, understood to be a province likely to vote in favor of Arias. Warns Japanese Chambers of Com-

merce Against Antagonizing Trade. Tokio, June 12 .- Baron Ishii in his first speech in his new capacity as vice foreign minister, addressing a joint meeting of the chambers of comjoint meeting of the chambers of commerce now in session at Tokio, gave an earnest of his attitude toward foreigners trading with Japanese, when he warned the chambers to avoid antagonizing foreign trade. Minister Ishii pointed out that new treaties would be effected in August, 1911, but that the proposals which must be drawn up by June 1, 1910, would almost exclusively be confined to the customs tariff. The peculiar position of Japan owing to the persistent campaign of misrepresentation of her motives, necessitated the most careful work in framing these proposals. work in framing these proposals.

He said that fear was already expressed among foreign merchants, that

a revision would result in the creation of prohibitive tariffs—against—foreign manufacturers. Continuing, Minister Ishii said that the world should be made to understand that Japan welcomed foreign trade, and would encourage it by every fair means. He invited the co-operation of the chambers and hoped they would offer suggestions regarding the revision of the tariff.


