

## AN ORDINANCE

In Relation to Nuisances.

SEC. 1 .- Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City: That no person shall cil of Salt Lake City: That no person shall have, make, use or keep at any place within the corporate limits of Salt Lake City, any noisome, offensive or unwholesome substance, or any vat, pit or pool of standing water, whether for tanner's, skinner's, dresser's, or other use, nor shall any person have a pig stye cow-house, shed, stable or privy, or suffer any offal or other refuse matter from the same to accumulate on their premises, which may cause any noisome, o ensive or unwholesome smell.

SEC. 2.—No person shall be allowed to stack or pile any hay, oats, straw, wheat or other combustible matter nearer than fifty feet to any dwelling-house or other place

where fire is used. S-C. 3.-No person shall east, or leave, or keep, in or adjoining any street, lane. WORLD'S FAIR at VIENNA!
