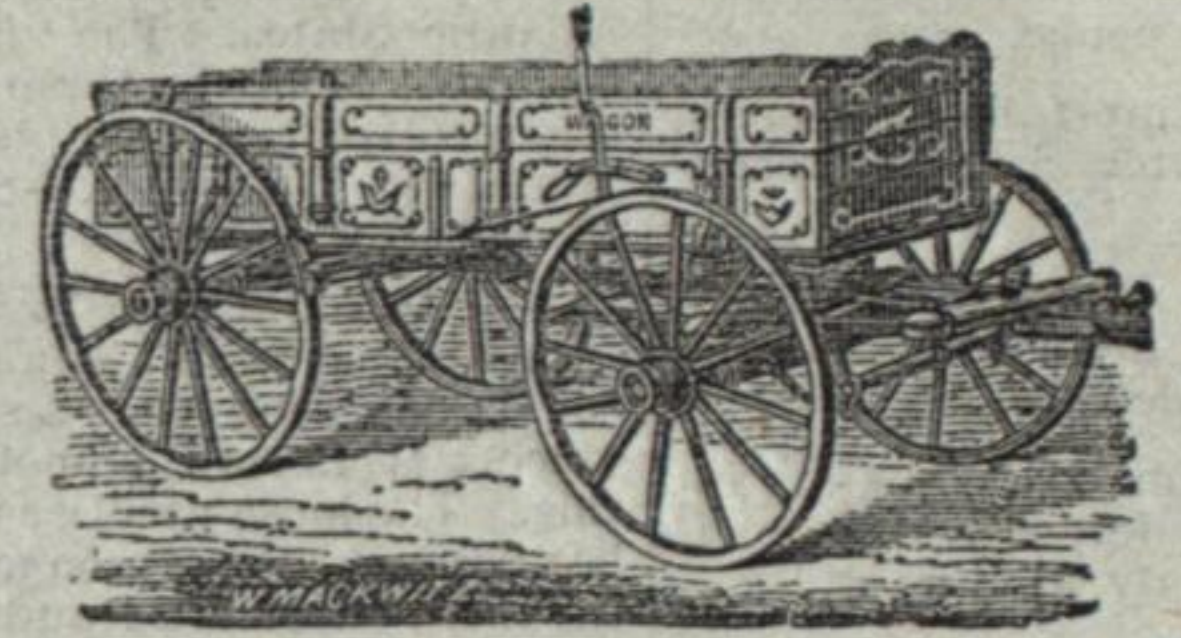

WORLD'S FAIR at VIENNA!

Three separate dispatches from Vienna combine to dispel all doubt as to what sewing machine has won the first honors of the great Exposition. The first was a special to the New York press on Monday, and was as follows:

VIENNA, August 15, 1873.

AN ORDINANCE

In Relation to Nuisances.

SEC. 1.—Be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City: That no person shall have, make, use or keep at any place within the corporate limits of Salt Lake City, any noisome, offensive or unwholesome substance, or any vat, pit or pool of standing water, whether for tanner's, skinner's, dresser's, or other use, nor shall any person have a pig sty, cow-house, shed, stable or privy, or suffer any filth or other refuse matter from the same to accumulate on their premises, which may cause any noisome, offensive or unwholesome smell.

SEC. 2.—No person shall be allowed to stack or pile any hay, oats, straw, wheat or other combustible matter nearer than fifty feet to any dwelling-house or other place where fire is used.

SEC. 3.—No person shall cast, or leave, or keep, in or adjoining any street, lane, avenue, alley, square, public place, road, or any yard, lot, field or premises in said City, any bones, putrid, unseemly, unwholesome or refuse meat of any animal, or any unsound fish, hides or skins of any kind, or the whole or any part of any dead animal or animal's, or any other unsound, putrid, or unwholesome substances, garbage, or offensive or useless parts of any beaver, calves, sheep, hogs or cattle, or any oil, garbage or filth from any house, out-house, stable, shop, store, hotel, restaurant, or other place.

SEC. 4.—No tanner, skinner, butcher or vendor of fish or meats, or other person, shall bring to or keep for the period of twenty-four hours in any part of said City, any undressed or uncurried hide, skin or leather, or any other material, whatever, which may cause any noisome, offensive or unwholesome smell. All things specified as offensive in this ordinance are hereby declared to be nuisances.

SEC. 5.—Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, on conviction therefor, be fined in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars for the first offense, and adjudged to abate or remove forthwith from said City the offensive matter with which he may be charged, and for any second or subsequent offense a fine of one hundred dollars, or imprisonment for six months, or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court, and the said nuisance may be abated or removed by the city authorities at the expense of the accused.

SEC. 6.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances heretofore passed relating to nuisances, inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.
