PARCELS POST IS GREAT SUCCESS.

10 miles, to send the same parcel 151 miles would cost about \$5.50.

HOTELS USE IT.

For the longer distances, however, the rates are not increased in the same ratio on packages that do not exceed 11 pounds. The 11-pound package, for instance, may be sent within the first zone, which covers a radius of 10 miles, for 4 cents. For all distances beyond that the charge is only 12 cents, which is little more than half the English rate.

As in England, an immense variety of articles may be sent by parcel post. In the leading hotels employ it to obtain speedy delivery of fresh fish. Buttery, cheese, eggs, farm produce and food stuffs generally, except in wholesale quantities, are usually sent by mail, because the service is cheaper, speedier and more efficient than that provided by any private company.

As in England, the government allows compensation for articles damaged or lost in transmission by parcel post, even when they are not specially insured, but the amount that can be claimed is limited to 75 cents a pound. One distinct advantage which the German system has over the English is that it permits of packages being sent "C. O. D.," which is a great boon to shopkeepers and public alike. It is available, too, for the sending of parcels to foreign countries. A parcel may be sent from Berlin to New York by the German parcel post cheaper than it would be transported from New York to Chicago by any of the private express companies operating between these points.

With both England and Germany successfully operating parcel post systems, and in the former case despite strenuous opposition from the railway companies, it is incomprehensible to Europeans that America, which claims to be the most progressive nation in the world, has not inaugurated a similar service. The fact that distances are vastly greater in America than in Great Britain or Germany affords no sufficient reason why the business should be left entirely in the hands of private companies. The English parcel post system extends over a much wider area than is covered by the United States, for it embraces the whole British Empire.

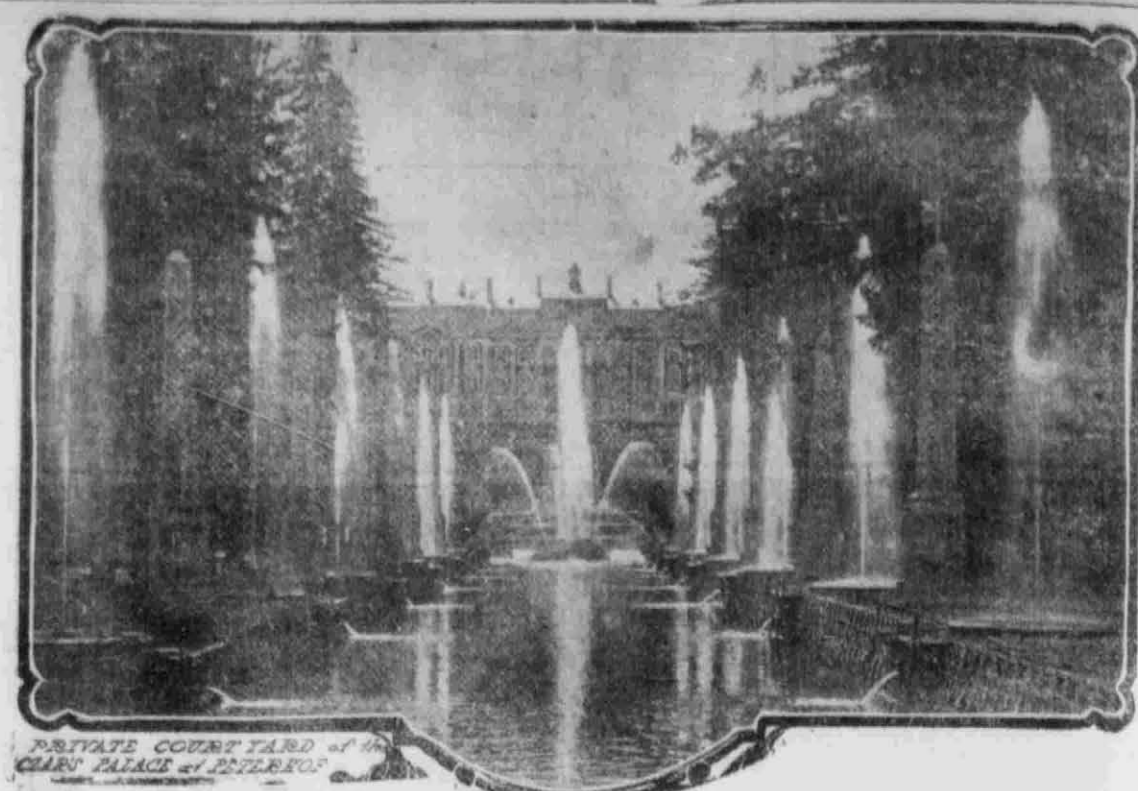

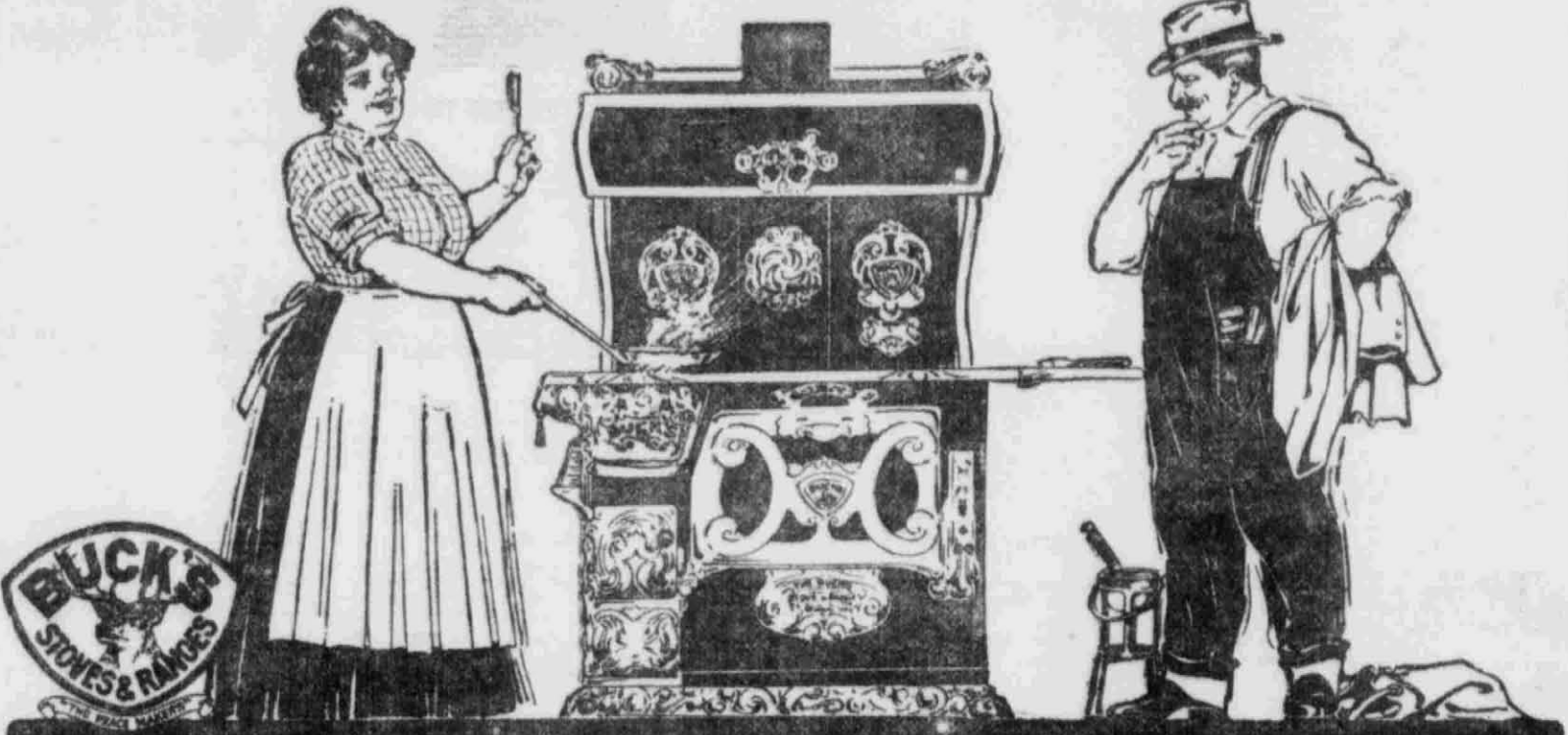

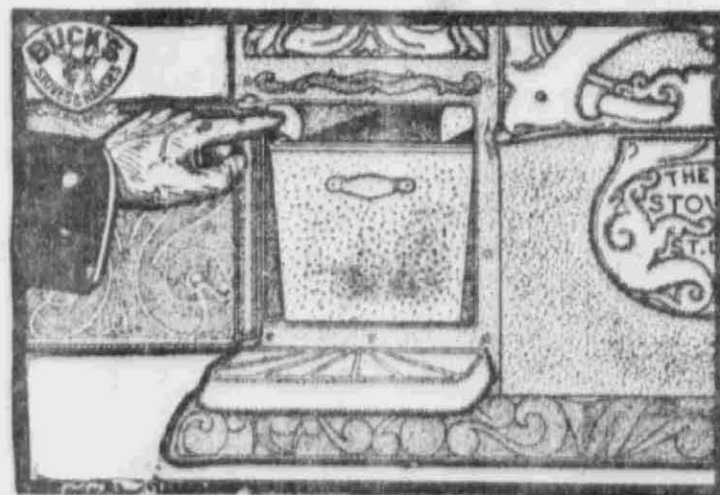
