### CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 7.—In the House about forty bills were reported and passed, the large majority being for personal relief to individuals. A bill for the payment of certain war claims, applying to over 200 individuals, aggregating \$112,000, was passed.

### EASTERN.

CHICAGO, 7.—A sensation was produced on the board of trade this morning when it was discovered that Frank Cambria, a member of the board, had been expelled from the board and had absconded, leaving about 550,000 to 600,000 bushels of wheat unpaid for. He has been a bull and speculator in wheat, and has been expelled from the board on account of his conduct.

### FOREIGN.

#### GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, 7.—The Lennie mutineers were examined at the Bow street police court today, and formally committed for trial on charges of mutiny and murder.

The board of trade returns for March show that the value of exports had declined four per cent over last year, and ten over the year before, and that imports had declined 10 per cent over last year and eight over the year before.

### DOMESTIC.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 7.—The famous domestic tragedy, commonly known as "The Newcomb Case," was decided today, by Chancellor Bruce, in favor of the plaintiff. The case is briefly this: In 1838 W. J. Newcomb married Mrs. Cornelia Read in this city; Mrs. Newcomb became insane and was put in a lunatic asylum; in 1840 she was adjudged insane. In 1872 the Kentucky legislature passed a law declaring that ground of divorce which is that the husband or wife is incurably insane, such insanity not being hereditary and not known at the time of the marriage. Under this act Newcomb got a divorce and subsequently married and had two children. In 1874 she died leaving a large estate, which was inherited by her two children of the first wife, however, instituted a suit for the property, on the ground that she had never been legally divorced. The case has been in the courts over two years. The decision holds that the divorce was absolutely void, and decrees to the first wife the property rights of the widow of Newcomb. The estate is worth a million and a half. Under the act in Kentucky the children of the second marriage are not illegitimate.

### REFUSED TO ANSWER QUESTIONS.

WASHINGTON, 7.—Thomas B. Conroy, of the New York Herald, was before the Clynner committee this morning, but refused to answer questions without Bennett's consent; he was ordered to proceed to New York and consult Bennett, and return to Washington next Tuesday.
