Park Valley Power Scheme.

Manager White of the Century takes kindly to the building of a power plant in Park Valley, which is projected by H. S. Joseph and others. Dr. White says a plant such as is proposed will be of great benefit to the mining prop-ertles in the district. The Century company's coal costs \$2.10 per ton to Corinne, while the freight rate from there to Kelton is \$2.30 per ton more. Added to this is the freight rate from the railway to the mine. Dr. White says electric power would make a sav-ing of about \$600 per month to the Century and he is willing to join hands with the promoters of the scheme.

Mercur Water Connections.

During the past week Manager Buter of the Gold Belt Water Co. has laid about 800 feet of new pipe line on Gold-en Gate Hill which will supply quite a number of new houses with water, says the Mercur Miner. He intends to bring over the Glencoe water tank and put on the Golden Gate hill as a surplus the water users of that section and the Geyser and Hecla gulches. The Golden Gate tank is sometimes emptied which breaks the syphon that keeps the water in the service pipe of those districts and there has to be about seven feet of water in the tank before the flow of water is resumed. The new tank, which has a capacity of 40,000 gallons, will hereafter be drawn on in such emergencles.

WOOL.

Where shearing is not done until the ambing reason is over, operations in that line are now in full blast and a moderate clip of wool is expected from this shearing. Prices are about as they have been during the past four or five weeks and both the local and eastern markets are holding a steady balance. Yesterday five carloads of wool were sold at Price, Utah, at figures rang-ing from 11 cents to 11% cents per pound and in a few days all of this spring's clip will be shipped and out of the way. Much wool is being consigned at 8 cents in the southeastern part of the state.

WHEAT.

Wheat, in price, demand and consumption is steady and brings these prices: Milling No. 1, white, 57 cents; red, 55 cents. There is a reasonably good demand and a moderate quantity offered in the market, so that prices are likely to maintain their present level for some time. Carload lots of Utah oats are exhausted and dealers are obliged to fall back upon the eastern product when bulk is required.

FLOUR.

Flour maintains the prices which have been in vogue for some time past, high patent bringing \$1.80 per 100 pounds, straight grade, \$1.60, and bak-ers' No. 1, \$1.50, the demand being about regular.
