WASHINGTON, 7.—Postmaster
General Gresham to-day heard a
continuation of the argument in the
lottery case.

Col. Moulton and Gen. Belknap
argued that the suspension of the
original order made by Postmaster
Gresham to Key prohibiting the deliv-
ery of money orders and registered
letters to the Louisiana Lottery Co.,
operated as an abrogation of that
order.

Stewart, representing ex-Rep-
resentative Robertson, contended that
the suspension was only intended to
allow a judicial determination of the
status of the lottery company. And
the appeal was dismissed by the
supreme court. When the suspen-
sion of the order expired, the proba-
bility of prohibition again pre-
valled.

Banders followed for the Loui-
siana Distribution Company, and
Southard spoke for the Colorado
Lottery Co.

After hearing Col. Moulton and
other counsel in the lottery case,
the Postmaster General reserved his
decision on the question as to
whether Postmaster General Key's
suspension of order of February 27th,
1880, is still in force.

In accordance with a resolution of
the House of Representatives, the
Government has been so notified,
and these articles are to terminate
on the 2d of July, 1883.

DEPORTITY AND BLANCK.

WASHINGTON, 7.—The loss to the
Central Railroad Company by recent
raids is estimated at \$300,000.
The destruction of bridges de-
layed the completion of the road to
Agua Caliente a month and a half.
Allen town, Penn., 7.—The works
of the Bethlehem Iron Company
shut down last night, and all em-
ployees went home. This morning
three thousand two hundred men
are thrown into idleness.

New York, 7.—Deaths this week
numbered 1,050 against 750 last
week. Total deaths of this week
for the city so far, 672. Three
additional cases of sun stroke are
reported in the afternoon, making 12
all for the week so far. There were

New York, 7.—In 1878, John and
Elizabeth King, pickle dealers, Vesey
street, were robbed of over \$30,000
in United States bonds, gold and
greenbacks, from their store. After
efforts to rescue the property failed
until lately the old people died, and
their son and daughter pursued the
robbers for years. The case was
brought to the attention of the
United States treasury at Wash-
ington that one of the four per-
cent stolen bonds for \$1,000 had
been sold in New York.

The matter has been placed in the
hands of a lawyer, who will carry
the case in court to recover the
bonds. From the evidence so far it
appears that the robbers were
disposed of in bulk at one place in
this city, which forwarded them to
a house in London. The man who
sold the bonds and acted as agent of
the robbers is now being sought by
surveillance, while his confederates
are spotted so as to be taken at a
moment's notice.
