IRON BLOSSOM BREAKS INTO SHOOT OF ORE

South Workings of North Shaft Finds Ore in Three Places—Deny Visitors Admission to New Workings.

Reports from Provo this morning were to the effect that Iron Blossom has broken into ore further to the south and that the quality is much improved over anything heretofore found. It is asserted that in the south workings of the north shaft ore has been encountered in no less than three places and prospects are good for the richest kind of an ore body being opened up further to the south.

It is understood that a number of people from Bunka were at the property this morning, but were denied admission. It is asserted that the company asked to be excused at the present time from allowing visitors to see the underground workings.

The report received this morning was that in one place the south drift where the company has found no ore for some time, the drift is now in ore and the quartz formation has become thoroughly mineralized. Full details of the present condition at the mine have not been received.

It is declared that there is considerable dissatisfaction at Bunka over the performance of Iron Blossom and many of the people are becoming wary.

It is asserted that the company is going on information that apparently comes from the inside and have been "stung."

A report was circulated yesterday that the mine was not looking as well as it might and orders to sell stock came in thick and fast this morning.

This afternoon, under the changes that are said to have taken place, the order to buy connected pling up. Perhaps a good press agent with "real dope" might do some of the "tintle" properties good. If he told the truth some fine gambling would be eliminated.

IRON BLOSSOM TAKES JUMP.

Goes Up Twenty Points on Salt Lake Exchange—Utah Exchange Business.

Iron Blossom was the strong feature of the Salt Lake exchange this morning and the stock came in for some jump. The market was better than yesterday. Early in the market there was considerable unloading and in a few minutes after the stock was opened on the regular board 11,300 shares crossed the rail at \$1.50. The stock was sold at points above where it rallied some time ago. This was followed by the selling of 4,400 shares at \$1.52. On the regular board it reached \$1.55, but dropped back again on the open board. It was that it continued to climb up at a rapid rate and within five minutes the stock was at \$1.70 with the demand for stock still unfulfilled.

The rapid change in Iron Blossom is said to be due to the discovery of more ore at the mine. This was in the south workings of the north shaft. The latest reports from the property declare that ore has been opened up in no less than three places.

The market on account of Iron Blossom was heavier than usual this morning and the number of shares of stock sold was 3,500, while the amount represented was \$31,250.

Under the influence of Iron Blossom, there was a better market during the latter part of the session and many of the Knight stocks showed a decided tendency to move up.

On the curb market this morning on the Salt Lake exchange, about the only active stock was Bingham Central Standard, which sold at 33 cents and 24 cents. On the Utah exchange, curb market Welmer Copper was offered at 4 1/2 cents and Montana at 16 1/2 cents.

The market on the Utah exchange showed a decided change this morning and business was better than it has ever been. The number of sales outnumbered that of any session thus far. The brokers are apparently getting over their bashfulness and are beginning to do business.

OPENING MINES CLOSE TO SALT LAKE CITY

Burro Mining Company and Several Others Begin Work on Extensive Scale in Davis County.

A number of mining companies having property to the north of Salt Lake City and in the vicinity of City Creek canyon have begun work on a large scale and something may be expected from that vicinity this summer. The Wandering Jew property in which Willard Wehe and a number of Salt Lake musicians are interested intends to begin work soon. The Buckland company is also doing considerable work. The Burro company is increasing its forces right along and the Little Giant is declared to be in line to ship ore at an early date. Relative to the mining companies of Davis county, the Davis County Clipper has the following to say:

One or two of these companies have worked a small force of men all winter and most of the others will resume work in the near future.

Burro Mining company, whose claims are located between Mill Creek and City Creek canyons, have had three or four men working all winter. This number has been increased to seven. It is expected that this force will be increased to 30 men in June when the company begins shipping ore.

In addition to the men at the mine, the company has four men at work building a road up the main canyon. The road in its meanderings up the canyon crosses the creek something like eight times. Many of these crossings have to have bridges built over them. The water is very high too.

CAMP RICHMOND.

What is known as camp Richmond has been established just above the forks of Mill canyon, which is the head-quarters for the road builders and the main base for supplies. Provisions can be hauled to this point with teams. From here they have to be carried by the men or taken on the backs of animals.

The company has just purchased four mules and four horses, one Studebaker army wagon, heavy ore wagon, and a buck-board.

An order has been placed with Silver Brothers' iron works for steel bunk houses, which are to be finished by June.

It is understood that work is to be resumed at the Wandering Jew mine at the summit of Sessions' mountain, in the near future.

IN WARD CANYON.

Newton Tuttle and A. T. Stone will likewise attempt to begin work on their claims in Ward Canyon as soon as the snow disappears. Mr. Tuttle was up there last week but he says the snow is still three feet deep on the sunny side and double that depth on the shady side.

The Buckland company will increase the force of men at its mine in the mountains east of Centerville.

James A. Pollock, president of the Salt Lake exchange, has gone to Pasadena, Cal.

D. C. Jackling expects to leave Saturday for Kelvin, Ariz., to look after operations at the Ray Consolidated Copper company.

The Boston-Sunshine property brought in its first good brick yesterday. This is the first brick ever made by the new mill of the company at Mercur, which is now treating about 125 tons of ore a day. The brick brought in was valued at something like \$6,000.

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Crescent Peak Mining company yesterday it was decided to equip the property at once and begin active work. An incline shaft of 150 feet is already on the property. President and General Manager A. J. Davis recently returned from inspecting the property.

The annual meeting of the Antelope Spring Mining company was held yesterday at which a number of directors were elected: W. H. Pritch, president; Fred W. Carrell, vice president and manager; Allen C. Atkin, treasurer; John W. Geiger, secretary; Gust Holm, Fred A. Hubbard and A. A. Kern, directors. The company levied an assessment of 2 cents a share.

Articles of Incorporation for the Lime Creek Oil company have been filed with the secretary of state. Capitalization is \$150,000, shares 10 cents each, 500,000 shares set aside as treasury stock. The company will operate in Salt Lake county. Officers are F. V. Bodfish, president; C. A. Gillette, vice president; James Owen, secretary and treasurer; Frank J. Gustin and K. C. Gustin, directors.

Manager Grant Snyder of the Beaver Carbonate property in Beaver county yesterday received word from Supt. Williams that at a point 415 feet from the shaft in the east drift the 700 level, a cross cut in the third shoot of ore encountered has been completed, but 24 feet with the entire distance being in ore. There is nothing as yet to indicate when the hanging wall should be reached. The ore is 10 per cent lead and 10 ounces in silver and is an excellent milling grade. The mine also has another good shoot of ore that shows 25.5 per cent lead and 46 ounces in silver.
