Halifax.—The debate on the resolution to repeal the confederation concluded yesterday. An address to the Queen embodying the resolution was sent to the Lieutenant Governor, to be submitted to the Queen.

Washington.—At twelve o'clock the Clerk of the House appeared in the Senate and read the resolution of impeachment passed yesterday, which was received in silence, and no action taken.

San Francisco, 25.—The Union State Convention for the election of Delegates to the National Republican Convention at Chicago, will be held at Sacramento, March 31.

The Mexican government has declared Puerto Angel, situated on the Pacific coast, of the State of Oajaca, a port of entry for foreign and coasting commerce.
