

PROGRAM FOR SPECIAL DAYS

Executive Committee of State Fair Outlines Features For the Week.

SCHOOL CHILDREN FRIDAY.

Great Gathering of Youngsters Sched-
—Judges Named—Big Race
Meet—Educational Exhibits.

The executive committee of the State Fair association met last evening and transacted an amount of important business in connection with the big exposition to be held at the fair grounds next week. The program for special days was partially completed, and it was decided that Wednesday will be Salt Lake day. Gov. Spry and Mayor Bradford will both issue requests that business be suspended on Wednesday afternoon in order to give everybody a chance to attend the fair. Educational exercises are being arranged for the occasion, and it is expected that this will be the biggest day of the fair. A special racing program will be prepared, and in many other ways will the day be made an important one.

Friday has been decided upon as school day, and in the afternoon all school children will be free. An effort is also being made to have all the schools of Davis county, as well as in the lower part of Salt Lake county, close for the afternoon. It is understood that the officials of Granite district are in favor of the proposition, and those of Davis county officials, who have been seen, are also favorable.

JUDGES SELECTED.

The judges of the exhibits in the manufacturers' building were announced last evening by F. J. Hewlett, supervisor of this department. They are, C. N. Strevell, H. M. Dimmoe and Walter Taylor. A loving cup nearly three feet in height has been offered by the fair officials for the best manufacturers' exhibit. This is the first time such a trophy has been offered for this purpose. The space in the manufacturers' building has all been allotted and workers are now busily engaged preparing the exhibits.

LOGAN A. C. EXHIBIT.

The old poultry house has been transformed into a roomy building in the hall, and will be used exclusively by the Agricultural college. The building has been repainted inside and out, and is an ideal place for the big exhibit of the Logan school. A corps of men is now at work arranging the various displays, which will include many new features. A display will be made of all the birds to be found in Utah, and information will be given showing what are good and what are harmful. A similar exhibit will be made of insects. A lecture bureau will be established in connection with the college exhibit, and members of the faculty will give illustrated lectures on subjects that are important to the people of the state. These lectures will begin at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and continue until 8 p. m. Each hour a different lecture will be given by some member of the faculty who is an authority on the particular subject under discussion.

UNIVERSITY BUILDING.

The University of Utah will also have a separate building, where a complete display will be made. This building will be finished by Saturday evening, and the display will be ready for the opening day. The increased number of entries in all departments has made necessary the erection of a number of temporary buildings. A small army of men is now at work, and everything is being rushed in order to be ready by Saturday night.
