

NEXT WEEK IN HISTORY.

JUNE 30. 1685—Archibald Campbell, ninth Earl of Argyll, was beheaded for rebellion against James II. 1755—Gen. James Edward Oglethorpe, founder of Georgia, died in Essex, England; born 1688. Oglethorpe was a valiant soldier who served his king in the armies of Marlborough and under Prince Eugene, the German ally. In 1733 he obtained a royal charter to found a colony in America, which he called after England's reigning king. After passing several years in the colony Oglethorpe returned to Europe, where he took command of an army and helped defeat Prince Charlie, the Scotch pretender, in the rebellion of 1745. Later he served in parliament. 1899—Emma Dorothy Eliza Nevitt Southworth, the American novelist, died in Washington; born 1819. 1900—The North German Lloyd steamers Saale, Bremen and Main burned at their North river docks in New York; 202 deaths reported. Desperate battle at Tientsin; foreign ministers ordered to leave Peking. 1905—Gen. Hugh Boyle Ewing, soldier, author and diplomat, died at Lancaster, O.; born 1828. JULY 1. 1882—James Crichton, the famous scholar and gentleman (The Admirable), was assassinated at Mantua, Italy, aged 22. 1725—The Comte de Rochambeau (Rochambeau), French general in America, born; died 1807. 1862—Battle of Malvern Hill, Va.; bloody repulse of the confederates. 1863—Thomas Francis Meagher, Irish patriot and American soldier, while governor of Montana fell from a steamer on the Mississippi and was drowned; born 1822. 1888—Attack on Santiago, Cuba, by Gen. Shafter's corps, battles at El Caney and San Juan Hill. 1905—John Hay, secretary of state of the United States, died at Newbury, N. H.; born 1838. JULY 2. 1844—Battle of Marston Moor. 1724—Frederick Theophilus Klopstock, German poet, was born; died 1803. 1850—Sir Robert Peel, British Liberal statesman, died; born 1788. 1881—President Garfield shot by Gulteau in the railroad station at Washington. Garfield was attacked while passing through the ladies' waiting room to join a party for an excursion in New England. The weapon used was a pistol, from which two bullets were fired. One bullet took effect in the president's back. The assassin had been promptly seized at the moment of shooting and proved to be Charles J. Guilan, a peripatetic but disappointed applicant for office. 1896—Harriet Beecher Stowe died at New Haven; born 1811. JULY 3. 1816—Mrs. Jordan, actress and mother of 10 children of William IV, died in obscurity at St. Cloud, France; born in Ireland 1782. 1883—Declative day at Gettysburg; Pickett's charge repulsed. 1871—Rome declared capital of Italy with imposing ceremonies. 1890—Idaho admitted as a state. 1898—Cervera's Spanish squadron destroyed by the American fleet under Sampson and Schley after escaping from Santiago harbor; Gen. Shafter demanded the surrender of Santiago. 1904—Japanese destroyers repulsed in an attack on the Russian fleet at Port Arthur; 2 destroyers sunk by the fire of Russian batteries. JULY 4. This memorable day in American annals is also noted as the anniversary of the death of three of the early presidents of the republic—viz. Adams, the second; Jefferson, the third, and Monroe, the fifth. 1804—Nathaniel Hawthorne, American author, born in Salem, Mass.; died 1864. 1867—Giuseppe Garibaldi, revolutionist, born in Nice; died in Caprera June 2, 1882. 1826—Thomas Jefferson, third president of the United States, died at Monticello, Va.; born 1743. John Adams, second president of the United States, died at Quincy, Mass.; born there 1735. 1821—James Monroe, fifth president, died in New York City; born 1758. 1888—Truce between the armies at Santiago. 1901—Prof. John Fiske, philosopher and historian, died at East Gloucester, Mass.; born 1842. 1906—A son born to Crown Prince Frederick William of Germany. JULY 5. 1758—George Augustus Viscount Howe killed near Fort Mifflin, N. Y. His skeleton was found there in 1890. Young Howe was with the vanguard of the colonial army, led by Major Israel Putnam, and he asked to be one of the first to meet the enemy. Putnam said to him, "If I am killed, the loss will be of little consequence, while your preservation is of importance to the army." The gallant Howe answered: "Putnam, your life is as dear to you as mine is to me. I am determined to die." He was killed at the first fire. 1801—David Glasgow Farragut, naval hero, born near Knoxville; died 1870. JULY 6. 1747—John Paul Jones (John Paul), distinguished American naval commander, born in Kirkcubbin, Scotland; died in Paris July 18, 1792. The name Jones was assumed about 1772, when John Paul resided at Fredericksburg, Va., on an estate left by his brother, who died that year. 1802—General Daniel Morgan, American revolutionary hero, died at Winchester, Va.; born about 1736. 1836—John Marshall, noted chief justice of the United States, died in Philadelphia; born 1755. 1886—Paul H. Hayne, southern poet, died near Augusta, Ga.; born 1820.
