

1685-Archibald Campbell, ninth Earl of Argyll, was beheaded for rebellion against James II.

1785-Gen. James Edward Oglethorpe, founder of Georgia, died in Essex, England; born 1658. Oglethorpe was a valiant soldier who served his king in the armies of Marlborough and under Prince Eugene, the Ger-zan ally. In 1783 he obtained a royal charter to found a colony in America, which he called after Eng-Inn,'s reigning king. After passing several years in the colony Ogle-'thorpe returned to Europe, where he took command of an army and helped defeat Prince Charlie, the Scotch pretender, in the rebellion 1725 The Comte de Rochambeau (Poshambo), French general in merica, born; died 1807.


