The terms of the measure provide that all corporations having capital sick and organized for profit shall pay tax of 2 per cent on their net earn-ings. Corporations coming within that designation will be compelled to make returns to specially named agents of the bureau of internal revenue of the ireasury department, giving the amount of their gross receipts, capital stock, bonded indebtedness and all other visible debts.

be collected. The 2 per cent tax will apply to all corporations organized for profit, but each corporation will be allowed a \$5,000 exemption.

PENALTY FOR FALSE REPORTS.

Any corporation which makes a false report will be subjected to a penalty, the amount of which was not decided tonight. Most of the participants in the conference expressed the opinion that it should make the opinion that it should range from \$1,000 to \$10,000

The tax will be collected upon the entire amount of preferred and common stock of every corporation and upon the bonds of a corporation where they exceed the total amount of capital. The police reached the scene a few minutes later, but the stranger had disappeared. Several people declared that he climbed into a waiting auto-mobile, after walking several blocks, but the police believe he is still in Fort Worth.
