Bill Rejected Frequently Discussed
By a Free Trader.

JOHNSON'S BAZZLING ORATION.

Bonelli in Vain Desires to Secure
Consideration for His Hawaiian
Resolution.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(Special)—The great debate on the tariff bill progressed yesterday, Hopkins, Illinois, made an able speech lasting an hour and a half.

Tom Johnson, Ohio, the free trader, manufacturer and monopolist, sheltered by the House by strenuously antagonizing the Wilson bill, steel rail trade, railroad, cotton houses, and all way measures generally. He estimated the Democratic measure reasonably, and made it for the most effective species yet delivered, it is a very absolute free trader.

THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—(Special)—Passed by the Senate, notwithstanding its opposition to the bill, the measure to increase the revenue by \$100,000,000, and to make it by the sub-commission on naval affairs selected from the committee of both houses, instead of by a special commission.

WATERS' SPECIAL SESSION.

Call of Appropriations, Without Power
to Tax, May 20.

DENVER, Jan. 10.—The special session of the legislature called by Governor W. J. Evans, to consider the state budget and other financial measures, was adjourned at noon. The governor's message was read in joint session, after which both houses adjourned till tomorrow, when another session of the legislature will be opened. The session will last but three hours, without passing any bills. The governor has been using all his influence on the popular side to have them vote to continue the session at least thirty days. Many have broken him, and it is now understood that a majority of both houses favor immediate adjournment.

THE TRIAL OF VAILLANT.

The Weeds who threw the bomb in the Chinese Bazaar.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 10.—The trial of August Vaillant, the anarchist who threw the bomb in the Chinese bazaar, began today. The court room was surrounded by crowds. Noisy was allowed to pass unbroken. The court was besieged. The opening was purely formal. A report is received that a bomb was found outside a burning house.

The court made short order of the trial, which resulted in condoning the plaintiff.

Lord Churchill alias Gold.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The Times has published a letter from Lord Churchill to a correspondent on the question of disunionism. Lord Churchill refers the correspondence to President Cleveland's message upon the subject, his striking arguments in favor of the repeal of the planking clause of the Sherman act, and his opposition to the bill brought over the Union. The letter gives an artificial value to some of the expressions America has recently set before us. Lord Churchill says he fails to understand how any combination can surpass the smallness from gold currency.

PLATE WORKS BUREAU.

HIGHWOOD, Ind., Jan. 10.—The plate works bureau turned out this morning. The cost is \$300,000; insurance, \$100.

A BRIDGE COST CUMBER.

DETROIT, Jan. 10.—All dealers in lumber and iron are agreed upon the forming of a timber and iron exchange. The cost is minimized from \$25,000 and \$25,000 to \$4. Eighty dealers are in the combine.

COMMERCIAL MERCHANTS FAIL.

The Members of the firm will pay the debts.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—W. F. Fox & Co., commission merchants dealing chiefly in salmons and canned salmon, have failed. The firm had been established at three-quarters of a million. They seek liquidation of the firm and will sacrifice their goods and will pay in full. The firm, however, failed to live up to the name of the new market, the majority of salmon and the inability to dispose of large quantities of salmon in the state. The firm had made many advances to farmers and shippers and had been unable to
