

BANKS MAY SOON BE PAYING CASH

Such Opinion of Financiers Who
Have Seen President and
Secy. Cortelyou.

GOVERNMENT DEPOSITARIES.

Treasury Insists That They Shall, as
Soon as Possible, Meet De-
mands for Currency.

Washington, Nov. 25.—A more confident tone in regard to the success of the new loans prevailed at the treasury department today than at any time since the announcement of the loans a week ago. The visit of Mr. Morgan on Friday and Saturday were followed today by a visit from James H. Forgan, president of the First National Bank of Chicago. Mr. Forgan saw the president, Secy. Cortelyou and Treasurer Treat, and expressed his belief that the banks throughout the country would be soon in a position to resume cash payments. The subject is of particular interest to the treasury officials, because for nearly a month government receipts have been declining as a direct result of the scarcity of currency. Disturbances, however, and others who are required to purchase internal revenue stamps have not been able to secure currency in sufficient quantities from the banks with which to purchase these stamps, and as the collectors are not allowed under the law to receive certified checks or anything but lawful money, except at their personal risk, the result has been that even a sufficient amount of stamps is difficult to obtain.

DEPOSITARY BANKS.

The government is insisting that depositary banks shall soon as possible meet the demands for currency in this respect. There seems to be a general desire among the bankers in New York, Chicago and other sub-treasury cities and financial centers to resume currency payments at the earliest possible moment, and Mr. Forgan's visit was made with a view of learning the views of the treasury officials on this particular subject.

Mr. Forgan represented that the Chicago banks would be able to resume, upon an understanding with the banks in other cities, within the next week or 10 days at the latest. Minneapolis and St. Paul banks, he said, were quite ready to resume at any time, and might take the initiative in this respect very soon. It is believed among the treasury officials that a complete understanding was arrived at between the banks of New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Cincinnati, Chicago, St. Louis, New Orleans and San Francisco, by which there will be a general resumption of currency payments within the next few days and possibly before the close of the present week.

CASH PAYMENTS INCREASE.

The reports received at the treasury department today from New York, Chicago and Boston are that currency payments at the latter two cities have increased, and that the situation at these cities and, in fact, at all other points, is rapidly improving.

It is known that New York and Chicago at present making daily shipments of large sums to the crop-movng centers of the west and south, and it is confidently believed that these shipments will be continued in increasing amounts until normal conditions are again reached or until the necessity for them has passed.

In addition to the discussion of cash resumption, Mr. Forgan left tangible evidence of his visit in a subscription by the Chicago clearing house banks for \$2,500,000 of the new one year certificates. Additional amounts of these certificates are steadily coming to the treasury as security for bank-note circulation. These represent allotments made by Secy. Cortelyou about the middle of last week.

Subscriptions for the Panama 2 per cent bonds are also arriving in large numbers. These subscriptions are so numerous that it is not expected that it will be possible to open, schedule

and classify the bids before closing the treasury department on Saturday night after the time for subscriptions expires at 11 o'clock. More than one day to complete the classification and comparison of bids in order to determine which bids are the highest.

TREASURY STATEMENT.

The daily cash statement of the treasury does not yet show the effect of any considerable payments for the new certificates. This is partly because only 25 per cent of the face value of the amount sold is paid into the treasury in cash, while the remaining 75 per cent is left with the banks on deposit. It is also due to a considerable measure to the time required for advices from offices to another of the transfer of funds.

Although applications and cash deposits for the new treasury certificates are being received at the treasury in increasing numbers from individuals as well as from national banks, it is learned that no allotments have thus far been made except to banks that desire to use them as a basis for circulation. All applications received from individuals and from banks whose limit under the law has been reached are being laid aside for the time being, and if allotments are made to them at all, it is believed it will not be as long as the present strong demand continues for them from banks desiring them for circulation purposes.

The declared purpose of Secy. Cortelyou in issuing the certificates was to increase the volume of outstanding currency, and this object, it is said, can best be accomplished through the increased issue of national bank notes.

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EX-SENATOR CLARK'S VIEWS.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 25.—Former United States Senator W. A. Clark, president of the Salt Lake railroad, today returned from a visit to the copper producing sections of Arizona. Asked for his opinion concerning financial conditions, he said:

"Financial conditions will show improvement just as soon as people cease suspecting one another, and in that way restore confidence. The situation in regard to copper is about the same as it was a month ago. Nearly all the wildcat concerns have been put out of business, and there has been a heavy curtailment in the established ones."

"We have curtailed production 50 per cent at Jerome and 60 per cent in Montana. It is unprofitable to sell copper at 12 cents, when it costs 12 or 12½ cents to produce it."

"Copper was about the first thing to be hit by the financial stringency, as some had been over ambitious in boosting the price, with the result that production was greatly stimulated. This condition is likely to last until the people release their money for circulation."

JUDGE HELM APPOINTED TO COLO. SUPREME COURT

Denver, Colo., Nov. 25.—Gov. Buchtel today appointed Judge Joseph C. Helm of this city associate justice of the supreme court to succeed Judge Charles F. Caswell, deceased. Judge Helm has been a leader in the Republican party, and at the bar since coming to Colorado from Iowa in 1875. In 1882 he was elected an associate justice of the supreme court, and later served as chief justice. He resided from the bench in 1891 to run for governor against Waite, but was defeated. Since that time he has been active in the practice of law. Judge Helm was born in Chicago in 1818.

SKYSCRAPERS' BANNER YEAR.

New York, Nov. 25.—This year 1907 has been a banner year for skyscrapers in New York. The records of the building department show that between Jan. 1 and Oct. 31 there were 51 permits issued for buildings more than 10 stories high. In the same period of 1906 there were 48 permits issued for such buildings.

MELVILLE CONVICTED.

Murderer of Guthrie Sentenced to Fifty Years' Imprisonment.

Helena, Mont., Nov. 25.—The jury in the district court at 10 o'clock tonight convicted George Melville, the slayer of Winfield Guthrie, of murder in the second degree and fixed his punishment at 50 years in the penitentiary. The crime with which Melville was charged occurred in Bald Butte last May. The direct cause of the trouble being the chase of a woman by Mrs. Melville of Mrs. Guthrie's 7-year-old son. The testimony of the victim's child, materially assisted the prosecution.

Melville's wife, 22 years old, has been married three times, her initial matrimonial venture being made when 15 years old. Her first husband was killed by her stepfather, who is now in the state penitentiary. The prisoner's wife was the principal in the Melville-Northey bigamy case two years ago in Butte. She was married to Melville in 1901.

NAVY PERSONNEL BILL.

Controversy Over Its Effect to be Settled in United States Court.

New York, Nov. 25.—The controversy over the effect of the navy personnel bill, which abolished the distinction between deck and engine officers and provided for the assignment of officers to either duty indiscriminately, will be settled in the United States court.

An amended answer in the suit of Edna Charles T. Wade against the International Magazine company, publishers of the Cosmopolitan Magazine for \$100,000 damages for alleged libel, just filed, brings out this point in the controversy.

The suit has its foundation in an article in the magazine dealing with the explosion on the gunboat Bennington in San Diego, Cal. harbor, July 21, 1906, in which 62 officers and men were killed and 40 injured. The article, it is claimed, lays the blame for the accident on the incompetency of the engine room force. Ensign Wade was chief engineer of the gunboat at the time of the accident.

ARRESTED FOR FORGERY.

New York, Nov. 25.—James J. Graham, assistant cashier of the Ingham Bank in Wall street, was arrested today and charged with the forgery of a check for \$2,500 drawn by James W. Daly, paying teller and Alfred Burrows, a depositor, were also arrested on a charge of complicity in the forgery.

N. Y. POSTAL CLERKS.

New York, Nov. 25.—The postal clerks of New York City are organizing for the purpose of attempting to induce Congress to reduce the working hours in this department to 48 a week. An

effort is being made to induce all the clerks employed in the various postal branches in the city to join the union, that a solid front may be made in the demand for shorter hours.

PLAGUE STATISTICS.

San Francisco, Nov. 25.—The plague situation shows much improvement. Only a few verified cases remain under treatment. The following figures were given out by the board of health today: Total number of verified cases up to noon last Saturday, 161; deaths, 68; discharged as cured, 39; verified cases still under treatment, 8; suspected cases, 23.

CANDY TEMPTED HER.

Little Girl Stole Money to Buy It and Got a Spanking.

New York, Nov. 25.—A week ago some one entered Henry Edelman's store at Linderhurst, L. I., and stole from the counter a package of currency and checks which he had made ready for the bank. The police were put on the case but were unable to find the thief. The 10-year-old daughter of a neighbor during the week had been a large purchaser of candy at the store, and today Edelman became curious and asked the child where she got the money. On close questioning the child broke down and told him she had taken it off his counter. She led him to her home and there in a box were the checks and money less \$1.80, which had been spent for candy. Edelman retained the money and the child received a spanking. Edelman refused to divulge her name.

MRS. COBDEN-SANDERSON

Comes to America to Lecture on English Suffragist Movement.

New York, Nov. 25.—Among the arrivals from Europe in the steamship Philadelphia yesterday was Mrs. Cobden-Sanderson, who comes to America to lecture on the suffragist movement in England.

Mrs. Cobden-Sanderson, who spent two months in jail for the part she took in an attack by the suffragists on the house of commons, states that the reports of the riots attending political meetings in England, where women demanding the right to vote, break up meetings being addressed by cabinet members are very much exaggerated. The only thing the women do, she said, is to go into the political meetings and ask questions. They are ignored and according to Mrs. Cobden-Sanderson, are finally ejected. She will address a meeting at Cooper Union, Dec. 13 and will tell of the campaign of the women of England to obtain the right to vote.
