

## INTERNATIONAL LABOR MOVEMENT

Attitude of Gompers and American Federation Bitterly De-nounced at Paris Congress.

### HUEBER, AN AUSTRIAN, NASTY

Called Gompers' Explanation a Mockery and Said It Was Time a Decision Was Reached.

Paris, Aug. 30.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, was the dramatic center of the first day's session of the sixth international trades union congress, when several European delegates bitterly denounced what they claimed to be the equivocal attitude of the American Federation with reference to joining the international movement. Mr. Gompers in reply insisted that the problems and policies of American trades unionism were so intermingled with American traditions and ideas that Americans could ill spare the time to encounter the influence of European leaders where the trades union tendencies were temperamentally different.

Nevertheless, as an evidence that the United States was anxious for international co-operation, Mr. Gompers introduced a proposal favoring worldwide organization which would "defend the rights and interests of all and create international fraternities and solidarity."

### CLASH OVER GOMPERS.

The clash came over the question of the exact status of Mr. Gompers and the federation in the conference. Mr. Gompers' statement was received coldly. Several delegates joined to object to protest. Hueber, an Austrian delegate, vehemently characterized Mr. Gompers' explanation as mockery. "We thank you for your opinions," he said pointedly, "but we do not need them. Your policies may not permit you to come to us, but one day, American workmen, you will realize that your policies are erroneous and you will see the necessity of joining the international confederation."

Mr. Gompers, smiling under the rebuke, arose to reply.

"I regret," he exclaimed, "that you have misconstrued my remarks as an

attack upon European trade unionism. I repeat, we sincerely desire international federation, but only so far as it preserves the American conception of unionism. If Europe does not want us, we will continue to do everything possible to attain the goal for which the human race is struggling—international fraternity and unity."

Hueber retorted that it was seven years since the Americans began talking about joining the international confederation, and it was about time a decision was reached.

Mr. Loh, the international secretary, reviewed the controversy with the statement that Mr. Gompers was only a guest, but he hoped that that official was convinced that the moment had arrived for the American Federation of Labor to join forces with their European brethren.

The regular business of the conference was then resumed and resolutions were adopted in sympathy with the strikers in Sweden and Barcelona and for an appeal to the unionists of the world to strive for the abolition of war.

PARIS PRESS COMMENT.  
The newspapers devote much space to the international congress and the significance of the presence of Mr. Gompers.

The Journal des Debats points out that the American Federation of Labor and the French General Federation of Labor, which did not join in the last two conferences, represent opposing conceptions of trades unionism.

### CARGO OF SEAL SKINS.

San Francisco, Aug. 31.—The steamer Homer arrived in this port yesterday afternoon with a cargo consisting of 14,368 seal skins valued at approximately \$500,000. This is the largest annual consignment of seal skins that has come from the Pribilof Islands for some time. After inspection by the customs officers here the furs will be placed aboard an express train and shipped to New York and thence to London, where they will be prepared for the market.

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## SECY BALLINGER GOING TO BEVERLY

Will Make a Hurried Trip Though  
Pres. Taft Says There's Nothing  
Particular to Discuss.

### THEY MAY TALK FORESTRY

Knox Goes Over Details of President's  
Meeting With Diaz at El  
Paso in October.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 30.—Secy. of the Interior Ballinger will make a hurried trip here to see President Taft, as soon as he can dispose of some important matters in Washington.

Mr. Ballinger notified the president today that he would endeavor to be in Beverly within 10 days. President Taft said there was no particular matter he desired to take up with Mr. Ballinger. It is understood, however, that he is secretary of the interior for certain reports regarding transactions which have figured in the forestry controversy.

Mr. Taft announced that a successor to Ormsby McLean, assistant secretary of commerce and labor, has been chosen, but no announcement will be made until it is learned that the man the president has in mind will be able to accept the office.

Secy. Knox discussed with the president today the details of his meeting with President Diaz at El Paso, Oct. 16. The arrangements for the exchange of courtesies are being made through the state department by direction of Secy. Knox. When he receives President Diaz at El Paso, the cabinet officers—Secy. Knox, Secy. Dickinson, Postmaster General Hitchcock and Secy. Nagel.

A detachment of United States troops also will be drawn up at "attention" to lend dignity to the occasion. After receiving President Diaz on American territory, President Taft will cross the international bridge and return the visit at Juarez. Mr. Taft then will return to the United States for a period of rest, and later in the evening will go again to Juarez to attend a banquet tendered by the Mexican government.

Among other announcements today was the selection of Henry Hoyt, former solicitor-general, as counselor of the state department. The counselor will deal with legal questions and will have supervision over the negotiation of treaties. The Japanese treaty is to be entered into within the next two years, and Mr. Hoyt will devote himself to this measure.

Secy. Knox also took up with the president the organization of the new far eastern bureau. It was stated several days ago that Edward T. Williams, United States consul-general at Tientsin, China, has been selected for work in this bureau.

Today Mr. Knox announced that Randolph Stevens Miller, Jr., Japanese secretary and interpreter of the American legation at Tokyo, would return to the United States to enter the new department.

Charles M. Pepper and M. H. Davis, special agents of the department of commerce and labor, have been transferred to the new bureau of trade relations on the tariff in the state department.

Mr. Taft made known his plan to establish his summer capital in Beverly again next year.

### DIRECT NOMINATIONS.

Assemblyman Conklin of New York  
Calls Them Greatest Gold Brick.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 30.—"Direct nominations, as we have seen them, make the greatest gold brick that was ever handed to a confiding people," was the declaration here today of Assemblyman Robert J. Conklin of New York city, a member of the special legislative committee appointed to investigate direct primaries.

"The people of New York state," he said, "have no idea of the political anarchy that exists in the middle western states. Direct nominations have driven parties entirely out of existence in many communities."

"In Wisconsin there is no longer a Republican party and a Democratic party. There are several factions, the most prominent of which are the stalwarts and the half-breeds. The latter are the followers of La Follette and the former are his opponents. Those who were at one time Democrats have disappeared and have gone into the Republican party, so-called, to vote at the primaries. There are no longer party primaries, but only personal views of faction leaders."

"To some extent this state of affairs exists in Iowa and Kansas. "Time and again I met with the ex-crescent from the biggest men in the cities we visited. 'For God's sake don't inflict this iniquity on the state of New York.'"

Chicago, Aug. 31.—Whether, under the federal law, prohibiting the mutilation of United States coins, the new Lincoln memorial pennies may be gold plated for use as cuff buttons, or the bill has been asked Capt. Porter of the United States secret service. His answer is in the negative. "The law prohibits such things," said Capt. Porter yesterday. "To gold plate these pennies or to any way mutilate them is a serious violation of law. We are on the alert to stop such violations."

### EFFECT OF EARTHQUAKES ON PANAMA CANAL

Washington, Aug. 31.—The earthquake shock felt on the Isthmus of Panama yesterday renews interest in the Walker commission report to President Roosevelt in 1901, embracing a comprehensive discussion of the general question of earthquakes, volcanoes, etc., on the Isthmus of Panama.

The commission said that it was evident that the entire isthmus was a volcanic region and that no portion of it was exempt from earthquakes.

Summarizing the result of the investigation the commission stated briefly that the "works of the canal will nearly all of them be under ground. Even the dams are low compared with the surface of the country and with their broad and massive foundations. They may be said to form part of the ground itself, as they are intended to do. The locks will all be founded upon rocks. It does not seem that works of this kind are in any serious danger of destruction by earthquakes in a country where lofty churches of masonry have escaped with a few minor injuries."

The opinion also was expressed that such danger as existed from earthquakes was essentially the same for both the Nicaragua and Panama routes, and that in neither case was it sufficient to prevent the construction of the canal.

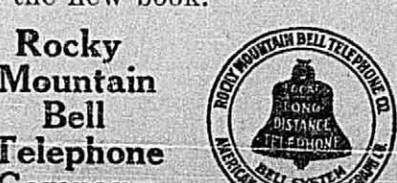
