FINE CROP PROSPECTS.

Dixie is Visited by Terrific Wind Storm - Water Wasting.

Special Correspondence. St. George, Washington Co., May 17.---About 10 a, m. yesterday, a southwest breeze sprang up which by noon had reached the force of a gale and contin-ued blowing till sundown, uprooting shade trees, tearing off limbs of fruit and foliage from orchards and vine-yards and blowing away boards and other moveables. The clouds of dust arose like mountains almost obscuring the sun. About sundown, however, the sun. About sundown, however, boreas modified and a cold wave came over our city, the temperature fell from 94 to 42, and before morning it was

94 to 42, and before morning it was near freezing point. The season thus far has been quite favorable for all crops. The first crop of lucern hay is being cut and hauled: it is very heavy, owing to abundance of water, good streams of which are go-ing to waste for the lack of suitable reservoirs. Wheat is headed out and prospects for a good yield of all small grain is good.

CONDEMNATION SUIT.

That of City vs Youngberg Now On Before a Jury.

The condemnation suit of Salt Lake The condemnation suit of Sait Lake City vs Hannah J. Youngberg, adminis-tratrix of the estate of Oscar J. Young-berg, deceased, is on trial before a jury in Judge Stewart's court today. The action is brought by the city to con-demn 72½ acres of land in Parley's can-yon belonging to defendant, to be used by the city in the construction of a storage reservoir. The defendant places a value of \$7,500 on the land and has refused to consider an offer of a smaller amount. Ole P. Skoog claims that he has a mortgage on the land for smaller amount. Ole P.
