JAPAN'S POSITION JURY CONVICTS CLEARLY DEFINED She Has No Desire or Intention to Guilty of Criminal Conspiracy to Encroach Upon the Rights Of Others.

SHE PUTS OUT A STATEMENT DISAGREED ON BENDERNAGEL

Has Gone Through a Bitter Experience and Her Statesmen Have Profited by It.

Tokio, Wednesday, Nov. 4.-It is not Japan's desire or intention to encroach upon the rights of others to win a way in the world by swashbuck ling. This is the position of the mikalo's government as made clear in semi-

official statements which have just been issued to the resident diplomats Japan, the ministry frankly de here. Japan, the ministry trankly de-clares, has gone through a period of bitter experience and her statesmen have profited by that experience. The clearing of the atmosphere, it is be-lieved, will make Japan's position among the nätions an easier one, and tends to relieve the suspicions which the people of the United States and other powers have sometimes enter-tained as to Japan's international in-tentions.

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INTERNAL POLITICS.

INTERNAL POLITICS. Constitutionalists, led by Marquis Salondi are in a position to command a majority in the house and are supposed to be independent. They hold 200 seats, while the Progressists, the next party in strength, hold 63. Judged by outward appearances alone, the Katsura cabinet finds itself confronted by a formidable majority in the lower house who might quash gov-ernment measures at any time. But those in close touch with the politics of Tokio concur in their precast that the twenty-sixth session will be a quiet one, and that the government will ex-perience no formidable opposition. The coming budget, the gist of which has already been given out, promises a reduction of some of the popular taxes and an increase of appropriation for the redemption of the national bonds. It is therefore expected to be a popular one. As a political move some believe that the Constitutionalists will propose a resolution for reduction of the law tax.

Defraud Government of Customs Duties.

SUGAR EMPLOYES

This Is Regarded as a Distinct Disappointment-Mercy Recommended In Each Case.

New York, Dec. 17 .- The jury tonight found guilty five of the six employes of the American Sugar Refining company, who have been on trial for the last three weeks, charged with criminal onspiracy to defraud the government of customs duties on imported raw su

In the case of James F. Bendermagel a former cashier of the company's Williamsburg plant, the jury disagreed. Mercy is recommended for all those

found guilty. The jury was out 10 hours. Under the indictment, Oliver Spitzer, a dock superintendent; John H. Coyle, Thomas Kehoe, Edward A. Boyle and Patrick J. Hennessy, checkers, may be punished for the commission of two overt acts, the maximum penalty for each of which is two years' imprisonment and \$5,000 fine.

The failure to convict Cashier Ben-dernagel is regarded by the government as a distinct disappointment. The ef-fort of the prosecution has been to trace the customs frauds aireday ad-mitted to a higher source, and Bender-nagel, though not an executive of the company, was an employe coming in contact with those who shaped the company's affairs in their larger as-pects.

pects. Special emphasis was laid by Mr. Stimson in his summing up for the prosecution on such of the evidence as tended to show culpability upon the part of Bendernagel. As other indictments are pending against the convicted five on which they are to be tried, it was agreed by the government that they be paroled in custody of counsel, with the right to renew bail when the argument for a new trial is heard. Mr. Stimson moved that the indict-ment against Bendernagel be served apart from that of the other defend-ants. To this the court agreed. Bendernagel put in a strong defense by the introduction of the testimony of prominent character witnesses. Tomor-row the defendants will appear and a date will be fixed for the argument on application for a new trial. Tonight's verdict brings to a close the government's first step in criminal procedure following the vast under-weighing frauds disclosed in the docks of the American Sugar Refining com-pany.

Walla Walla, Wash., Dec. 18.—Skin from the bodies of 347 persons has been grafted upon the burned body of Reed Crows, a young lineman who narrowly escaped electrocution when he fell across two power wires at the electric substation here two weeks ago. An appeal was made by physicians for vol-unteers to provide portions of their cuticle and the response has been unan-imous, so that at the present time over 960 square inches have been grafted from the bodies of friends and sympa-thizers on to the body of the injured man.

Among those offering portions of their Among those offering portions of their skin were 75 students from Whilman college, 50 from Walla Walla high school, 125 from the public schools and 25 solders from Fort Walla Walla. The skin-grafting is still going on and voluniters are being operated on at the rate of 20 a day.

EDHEM PASHA DEAD.

Commanded the Turkish Forces in Gracco-Turkish War of 1897.

Gracco-Turkish War of 1897. Cairo, Egypt, Dec. 18.-Edhem Pasha, commander of the Turkish forces in the Gracco-Turkish war in 1897, died here yesterday. Edhem Pasha was one of the ablest generals of the Turkish army. The German general, Von Der Goeltz, who reorganized the sultan's army and who was chief of staff to Edhem through the Greek campaign, entertained the highest opinion of his cleverness. Ed-hem was a member of an old Turkish family which professed Islam for gen-erations. erations.

New York, Dec. 18.—A jury before Supreme Court Justice Goff returned a verdict yesterday for \$2,500 in favor of Clara Martin and against Nicholas Al-thus, because the latter's horse kicked the woman and broke her leg when she was crossing a street. The defendant contended that the horse was gentle and kicked because feathers on the woman's hat had tickled him on the nose when she passed.
