During the first twenty of these thirty years, communica-tion with the outside world was

slow and expensive, except by telegraph the latter part of the time. During this period the desert had to be redeemed from its un-fruitful condition by cultivation and irrigation, the latter involving a vast amount of labor, in constructing water channels, unknown to proneers in settling most other portions of the public domain. For ten years of this time, these isolated colonists were compelled to contend with myriads of migratory insects for scanty means of subsist-ence. For twenty years, with but
