# IMPROVEMENTS BADLY NEEDED

Disgraceful Condition of Streets Discussed by Committee.

### TO OFFER A RESOLUTION.

It Will be Introduced at the Next Meeting of "City Fathers"---Work not Properly Done.

The disgraceful condition of the streets of the city and especially around the city and county building, was the subject of considerable discussion before the council committee on streets last night, and it is probable that a resolution will be introduced at the next meeting of the coun-

cil, providing for putting the streets in better condition.

At the corner of Fourth South and State, the street is in a most unsight-ly and almost impassable condition and is certainly a disgrace to the city. The sum of \$150 was appropriated to fix up that crossing last Monday night, and the street supervisor has been hauling crushed rock and gravel and placing it there as fast as possible, but it seems to sink into the mire and does not fill up the mud hole at all. Councilman Tuddenham called the committee's attention to the matter, and declared that the work was not being properly done. He said that the middle of the intersection should be drained and some of the mud scraped away before the rock and gravel is put in.

ORDINANCE PASSED. An ordinance was passed months ago providing for the paving of all the streets around the city and county building and some of the property owners paid their tax for the improvement last spring, but it seems that the great "American" administration has great "American" administration has not been able to get to the paving this year. The county paid its portion of the tax last May, expecting that the work would be done during the present year. It paid \$4,000, and the city is getting the use of that money, but has not done a thing towards the improvement. The commissioners will probably take the matter up and write the city council a letter about it.

CONDITION OF ALLEYS.

The communication from the Com-mercial club in regard to the bad condition of the alleys in the business district was also considered by the streets committee, and was referred to Mayor Thompson for consideration. The mayor vetoed a resolution last week requiring the owners of the alleys to pave them for the reason that asphalt paving cannot be laid in the winter time. It is not probable that the mayor will do anything in regard to

mayor will do anything in regard to the matter until spring.
Fernstrom called the committee's attention to the fact that the Salt Lake Sanitarium company was laying wooden pipe in its new pipe line through the streets of the city in places where its franchise calls for cement or tile pipe, and he asked that the matter be investigated and the "ork stopped. The council will probably take the matter up next Monday night.
