## WESTERN MARKET LETTER.

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Stock Yards, Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 5-A smaller run of cattle last week at the principal markets, together with a threatened shortage of short fed steers, caused buyers to trade more lively, and the market advanced 15 to 25 cents on country grades and fed steers. Cows had already been selling stronger than steer prices warranted, and prices on them declined a little during the week. The supply today is during the week. The supply today is fairly liberal, at 11,000 head, though not as heavy as last Monday. The market is stead on everything except heavy fed steers, which are weak to 10 lower. A string of high class Colo-rado feeders, 895 pounds, sold today at \$4.45, and some 624 pound Colorado stockers at \$3.80. This is about the range of the fair to good stuff. Heavier steers rold last week at \$3.80 to \$4.30, cows and heifers, \$2.90 to \$3.25,
