A SHERIFF'S OFFER.  
A. A. Keen's creditors are promised  
a speedy settlement.

CHICAGO, Jan. 2--This evening  
Anthony Mayer, representing the  
creditors of S. A. Keen, received a  
surprising offer from the assignees  
of the insolvent banking firm. The  
offer was that the creditors be paid  
35 cents in cash by February 1st,  
and 15 cents later, making the  
total 50 cents on the dollar, the  
condition that Mayer agreed to  
drop all his proceedings against the  
firm and accept the offer, although he  
cannot say anything about the criminal  
proceedings, as he has no interest in them.

Mayer said he would not under-  
stand why the assignees should  
pay 35 cents when by their statement  
he had declared that not more  
than 5 per cent could be realized.

He left the impression, however,  
that Keen's liabilities are approximately a million and a half,  
of which three-fifths are secured.

THUNDERSTORM WITH FLOODS.  
PITTSBURGH, Pa., Jan. 2--The  
river tonight is twenty-two feet  
and rising slowly. Several large  
timber rafts are being driven  
down the river. The Pittsburgh &  
Western tracks are covered, but it  
is thought the cold snap stopped the  
flood in time to save damage here at  
least. Heavy washouts are reported  
on the Panhandle, Wheeling and  
Lakes roads. In Eastern Ohio, on the  
Cleveland & Ohio, a division of the  
Kanawha River is rapidly rising and  
the low grounds are leaving. At Jackson  
town serious alarm exists tonight  
because of the large amount of ice  
upon the river several miles from  
the city.

TRAINS DUG OUT OF THE SNOW.  
KANSAS CITY, Jan. 2--The last

today's snow-storm did not reach  
the Union depot until 5 o'clock this

A SNEAKING BLIZZARD.

trains were abandoned in some instances  
and all but one or two abandoned  
trains scheduled to leave this morning  
are abandoned.

TERRIBLE WIND.  
ST. LOUIS, Jan. 2--A special  
from Athens says a terrific wind  
blew there last night, doing great  
damage to buildings and other property.  
No loss of life is reported.

TRAIN WRECKED.  
NEW YORK, Jan. 2--A west-  
bound express train on the Lackawanna  
road was today wrecked near  
West Paterson last night, some  
minutes having fixed a switch so  
the engine was thrown on an under-  
pass and was badly wrecked and  
a large number of passengers were  
seriously injured.

the country. His family reside in  
Helena. Leiter was an old settler.
