A pl. of quorum, etc., from the Latin word "quorum erunt." A. B. esse voluntis" (of whom we desire A. B. to be one) forming part of ancient commissions, as of justices.

TO NUMBER
THE POPULATION

FORTY-SIX MORE CENSUS ENUMERATORS ARE APPOINTED.

BUT FEW VACANCIES LEFT.

TWO HUNDRED AND THREE OUT OF THE 310 DISTRICTS IN THE STATE ARE FILLED,
INCLUDING THE INDIAN RESERVATION.

Forty-six of the fifty-two vacancies in the corps of census enumerators have been filled by Supervisor of Census Pratt, and the appointments have been confirmed by the director of census at Washington. The State has been divided into 210 census districts, including the Uintah and Uncompahgre Indian reservations, which are counted as one district. No appointment has been made for the reservations as yet, but it is expected the Indian agent will enumerate the red men, squaws and papooses. Some time ago an approved list of 157 appointees was published. The present list of forty-six given below leaves a balance of six to complete the complement. The nominations for those six were sent to the census director on Wednesday, and their approval will be received in a day or two. These six districts are No. 56, Big Cottonwood; No. 88, North Brigham; No. 83, Richmond; Cache County; No. 108, Bear Lake; Minnerville and District; No. 112, Clover, Sunshine and Vernal; No. 128, Huntington.

The commissions were today mailed in registered envelopes to the enumerators, who are expected to qualify immediately and forward their oath of office to Mr. Pratt in this city. As soon as he receives the qualifications, Mr. Pratt will forward the portfolios of supplies and badges to the enumerators, who will begin their work on the morning of June 1st, and are expected to complete it by July 1st in the country districts, and by June 15 in cities of over 8,000 inhabitants.
