Directors Met Today and Posted | Bulls Disappointed Because of Failure to Connect.

ABRUPT DECLINE FOR WHILE

The Net Result to a Narrow, Peverlsh and Uncertain Market.

New York, Sept. 12 .- The stock market opened very active with lower prices. Traders showed some concern over the monetary situation, yesterday's late flurry in rates disturbing sentiment somewhat. Dealings became very confusing, supporting orders appearing in spots while other stocks were sold. The failure of London to respond to the St. Paul dividend action and the B. & O., stock increase disappointed the bulls and there was general selling of this account. Both St. Paul and B. & O. were very feverish and covered a range of about a point. Missouri Pacific, which lost two at the opening was pushed up to about yesterday's closing level again, but other

opening was pushed up to about yester-day's closing level, again; but other southwesterns were sluggish and heavy. Toward 11 o'clock the market declined abruptly under the lead of Southern Pacific and U. P., which were offered freely. Losses were quite generally extended all through the list, and the selling movement broadened.

New York Airbrake lost 3½ and United States Express 4. An opening rate of 10 per cent for call money followed by a rise to 12 per cent led to the closing out of bull accounts and encouraged short selling. Speculation became very quiet later but showed very little tendency toward recovery. Railroad bonds were irregular at noon.

Prices hardened but the demand was too small to effect much of a recovery

Prices hardened but the demand was too small to effect much of a recovery outside of Missouri Pacific, which touched 122%, and again relapsed a point. Continued higher money rates and the prospect that the banks would have to call in loans extensively in order to make an effective showing tomorrow of surplus reserves discouraged confident buying and invited realizing on every slight rally. On the other hand the ability of the various pools to advance to their favorites materially during the week, despite the money rates checked any decided demonstration by the bears and the result is a narrow, feverish and uncertain market.
