TRIP SURE FOR CADETS.
Commandant Webb Makes Definite Arrangement at High School.

That the Salt Lake high school cadets will go to Seattle to attend the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition, was the purport of a message delivered to the cadet corps by Capt. William C. Webb at the assembly of the cadets held yesterday.

The battalion, including the band, staff, commissioned and non-commissioned officers and four companies will represent Utah in the exposition, commanded by Capt. Webb, and the cadets cheered.

The statement was made as the result of the conference of the committee, headed by Capt. Webb, to investigate the feasibility of undertaking the trip. The financial part is the only remaining feature to be met, but the cadets themselves, who are asked to raise \$1,500, will it is expected, raise at least \$2,500, and the governor's committee will do the rest. The trip will be made, according to the present arrangements, during the latter part of August.

AMENDED PETITION IN FREIGHT RATES

Commercial Club Traffic Bureau Asks Hearing on Charges Against Fifteen Companies.

(Special to the "News.")
Washington, June 10.—An amended petition was today filed by the Commercial club traffic bureau of Salt Lake City with the interstate commerce commission, asking for an investigation of complaints of unjust discriminations in freight rates to Utah cities, charged by 15 railroad companies operating lines entering the State of Utah. The amended petition recites that the people of Utah are reasonably entitled to generous treatment and helplessness at the hands of its principal common carrier service, but on the contrary, arbitrary, oppressive and exceptional methods of transportation rate-making have been employed, calculated to promote Pacific coast cities and create commercial servitude and distress for the cities of Utah.

The petition specifies the violation of the first, second and third sections of the interstate commerce act in freight rates charged upon fruit from California shipping points to Ogden, Salt Lake and Provo, and upon various commodities shipped from Chicago, Mississippi river and Missouri river freight transportation territory to Utah points, also that an unjust discrimination against Utah points is maintained in passenger rates to and from eastern and western points.

It charges that a secret agreement exists among the defendant railroad companies under which division and distribution of through freight traffic is made and competition virtually eliminated, also that a secret agreement exists between the Southern Pacific, Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, Oregon Short Line and other railroads for a partition of traffic territory under which freight and passenger traffic competition is virtually eliminated and public service impaired to the great detriment of the commercial interests of Utah.

TO HOLD INQUIRY IN OGDEN.

Governor Names Board to Conduct Investigation of H. H. Thomas.

A. C. Nelson, superintendent of public instruction, Dr. E. G. Gowan, judge of the juvenile court, Rabbi Charles J. Freund, of the Jewish congregation of this city, and Nathan T. Harris, district attorney of Weber county, with the board of trustees of the state industrial school at Ogden, will act as a board of inquiry into the charges made against Supt. H. H. Thomas.

The first session of the investigation will be held at Ogden, beginning at 10 o'clock next Monday morning. The inquiry will be held there for the reason that nearly all the witnesses who have made complaints are there.
