SALT LAKERS IN EGYPT.

R. H. L. A. CULMER is in recelpt of an interesting letter F. from Colonel Edwin Holmes, who with Mrs. Holmes is making an extended visit in the land of the Pharaohs. The communication, which is vividly descriptive of a sunset in the valley of the Nile, as well as places and buildings of historic interest, is written from Assouan, Upper Egypt, under date of Jan. 29, 1997, and reads as follows:

We are living in a "rlot of color," if you know what that is, and are unable to account for it. Nor do we believe it can be painted, the shades are so delicate and so graded into one another that it would seem impossible to reproduce it in any way satisfactory. Doubtless you artists may be able to expiain this almost phenomenai richness of hue, and I wish very much you could see it yourself. The whole horizon, from west around to east when horizon, from west around to east when the sun sets, is a nen and deficate mass of times, which continues until nearly an hour after sunset, and is changing all the time. Doubters the rich coloring of the great sandy des-erts all around, possibly the particles of sand dust in the air, the entire absence of carbon or of moisture in the sar, may account for it in part.

If one goes further than that they take boat again to Gondokoro, another thousand miles or so. For all the wa-ter of the Nile comes from near the equator, and if you know your ge-ography, as you ought, and I suppose you do, you will realize that the Nile is one of the longest and drains the greatest area of any river in the world. In making the trip thus far we made many stops and saw many temples and tombs, the like of which I had never dreamed of, although I had been read-ing about Egypt ever since I could remember. We have been seeing pyramids by the score; temples by the dozen, and tombs without number, in nearly all of which the red porphyry granite is more or less freely used, and the harder, almost jade-like, gran-lie in statues, and the finish is almost perfect. perfect.

WORLD'S GREATEST STATUE.

WORLD'S GREATEST STATUE. At Thebes, near Luxor, lies the wrecked statue of "Rameses the Great," the greatest statue probably ever erect-ed by the hand of man, its weight es-timated at 1,000 tons, broken and muti-lated by Cambyses, the "Persian Con-queror," 525 R. C.; and at Assouan, the first Cataract, is the only granite of this kind found. Here it is the regular formation, making it possible to build that engineering wonder, the great Assouan dam, the formation furnishing the foundation and the quarries here the stone used in the giant structure; and I could not help thinking today, as I walked the length of this most tremendous piece of masonry, of the statement that the great pyramid would furnish material for half a dozen such structures. structures.
