That the price fixed for a quarter yearly license may be made the price for any time less thas three months; and said coun-ty courts shall require payment for all licenses invariably in advance. Upon the applicant paying the required amount to the county clerk, said clerk shall issue the de-sired license for any term not exceeding one year. without first obtaining a license therefor sired license for any term not exceeding one SEC. 3.-No such license shall be transfer able unless such transfer shall be sanctioned by the county court or probate judge.
