## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**To Sail the Lake.**—The Y. M. C. A.'s social department is arranging for a three days' trip over the great lake in Capt. Davis' yacht.

**Preachers Horse Stolen.**—Horse thieves are reported busy at Bingham and Rev. F. E. Eddy of the Unitarian church is one of the sufferers.

**To Lay Corner Stone.**—The corner stone of the new Westminster college will be laid at 4 p. m., Thursday, Aug. 23, with appropriate ceremonies.

**Eagles' Convention.**—Quite a delegation of Eagles will leave this evening to attend the annual convention of the order which convenes at Milwaukee next week.

**Woman Killed Coyote.**—Miss Maud Waters of Shoshone, Ida., who is visiting with the family of Dr. W. M. Thome of east Tenth South street, distinguished herself the other night by picking off, with a rifle, a coyote that had killed 12 of the doctor's chickens.

**Chase-Chace Reunion.**—The seventh annual reunion of the Chase-Chace family association will be held at Hotel Vendome, Boston, at 10:30 a. m., Thursday, Sept. 6, 1906. Ex-Gov. Bates and representatives of several of the leading family associations of New England are to be guests of the Chases on this occasion. **Kelly Filter Press.**—The Kelly Filter Press company of this city has filed its articles of incorporation in the county clerk's office. Its capital stock is \$250,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. John W. Kelly is president, A. G. C. Wilcox, vice president, E. R. Pembroke, treasurer, A. L. O. Genter, secretary, D. J. Kelly, manager. The company controls the patent rights to the Kelly filter press and the Kelly sand and alum separator.

**Bert Harris Missing.**—Bert Harris of Butte, aged 22, and his mother came to this city last Wednesday from Montana, and when the train was at Burlington, young Harris went into the rear of the car, and was not seen again. His mother took rooms at the Conway on West Temple street, and with the help of the police, is trying to locate her boy. At the same time, he is said to have been seen in this city asking help from people to find his mother.

**"Rough House" in Laundry.**—The American laundry, across from the police station was the scene yesterday afternoon of a "rough house." One of the girls operating a machine got her hand caught in the roller and was slightly injured. Chris Opie, a driver, started to apply turpentine to the injury when Engineer J. W. Clark snatched the can away from Opie. This started a fight during which several took a hand. The police were called in and placed Opie and Clark under arrest. They were released after furnishing \$10 bail.

**Brings Good Report.**—Hyrum Sainsbury is back from a trip to Garland where he found the entire country in a high state of cultivation. The beets are in fine shape as there is no fly or blight this season, while the dry land grain is so high that heading machines can not be used, but the regular reapers have to be called into service, and the grain has to be bound and stacked just like the irrigated wheat. Generally, the dry bench wheat only grows to a very moderate height, and heading machines are used, which clip off the tops and leaves the straw to be plowed under or burned over. The country looked very attractive to Mr. Sainsbury.

**ANOTHER ARREST MADE.** Frank Moultrie, Garbage Man, Charged With Creating Nuisance.

Deputy Sheriff Fred Butler, yesterday arrested Frank Moultrie, a garbage wagon driver, for dumping garbage at Fourth South and Eleventh West streets, and thus creating a nuisance. This is the dumping ground which was protested against last week by the residents of that vicinity and resulted in the arrest of Health Commissioner Stewart. Sanitary Inspector Margrett and three other garbage wagon drivers upon the charge of creating a nuisance. The complaint against Moultrie was sworn to by Rev. J. H. Worrell, who also swore to the complaints against the other men involved. Moultrie was taken before Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith and was released upon his own recognizance until the date of his arraignment, which has not been set.

**GREEK ATTACKS GUARDSMAN.** Drink Crazed Man Struck Burkhardt With Billiard Cue.

Fred J. Burkhardt, post quartermaster's sergeant, N. G. L., was viciously attacked about 11 o'clock last night by a drink crazed Greek, whose name could not be learned, in a saloon at 143 West Second South street. From all accounts it appears that the Greek had had a row with a soldier. The latter had left the place and when Burkhardt appeared, the Greek sprang upon him and struck him over the head and shoulders with a billiard cue, Burkhardt fell to the floor and was stunned for several minutes. The Greek dashed out of the place and disappeared. Burkhardt was taken to the armory where his injuries were attended to. He was slated to leave this morning for Fort D. A. Russell with the guard.
