**Going to England.**—Elder Joseph F. Smith expects to leave for England about the latter end of next month, for the purpose of presiding over the European mission, Elder Albert Carrington having been released to return home.

**Editor Deseret News:**

**Effects.**—Considering that Utah, being in territorial vassalage, has no voice in the presidential election, the excitement produced in this city, among the adherents of the contending parties, has been very remarkable, and very unusual. Many men have been so anxious about the result that they have not done any work or business since the 6th. One of the anxious ones remarked this morning that he wished the thing was settled one way or another, so that he could go to work.

There has been some rough and uncomplimentary talk, by adherents of both parties hereabout, some in favor of the party now in power going so far as to say they would rather shoulder the gun and fight than that the democrats should gain the issue, one government official being specially "eager for the fray" in that event. But, of course, that is all talk, and the loudest talkers are generally the first to get out of harm's way in time of real trouble. The other side has in some instances been equally belligerent in its expressions, but so long as it goes no further than words, which are frequently only wind, it won't matter much, but we admonish everybody that there must be no fighting. If there is to be any genuine physical encounters for supremacy hereabout, let the contumacious and pugnacious ones go to Faust's race track or somewhere over Jordan, or up Red Butte Cañon and have it out, but keep quiet in the city. Those disposed to quarrel should consider the ultimatum of the personal encounter between Messrs. Leatherby and Bartholomew, who commenced talking politics in a mild zephyr, ending in a figurative tornado, as published in last night's News.

As the present possessor of the present political "bone of contention" said, and it was one of the most elaborate speeches he ever made, "Let us have peace."

**A Most Lamentable Accident.**—Shortly after eleven o'clock to-day, two little boys, sons of Brother Richard V. Morris, of the 19th Ward, were crossing East Temple Street, near this office, and as the street car was turning the corner at the time, going south, the driver was unable to see the little fellows, as a wagon was crossing the track at the time and intercepted his view, the boys being on the south side of the wagon. The younger one, between three and four years old, was knocked down and a wheel passed over the poor little fellow's legs, between the knee and ankle joints. One of the limbs was almost severed in two, and the flesh fearfully bruised and torn. The other limb was cut to the bone and the flesh terribly mutilated and bruised, but the bone was not broken. The leg that was not

broken was probably partially saved by being under the other when the wheel passed over. Of course there is no alternative but for the poor child to lose the right limb, but the other can, it is believed, be saved.

The accident created a great deal of excitement and feeling. The dear little boy was picked up and carried to the office of Dr. Benedict, where he received the necessary surgical aid, several other surgeons stepping in while his injuries were being attended to. Meantime word was dispatched to his father, for whom and his mother, as well as the unfortunate child, there is the deepest sympathy. He is a beautiful boy, fat and fair, with a sunny and attractive face.

Since the above was written the almost severed limb has been amputated, by Dr. Benedict, and the child was taken home, in a carriage, by his parents.

**The Election.**—According to the latest and most reliable reports received during the last two days Tilden and Hayes have been both elected President of the United States.

**Uncertainty.**—The matter of Tilden's election still continues to be pretty much in a haze.

## LATEST DISPATCHES.

**Another Majority.**  
NEW ORLEANS, 10, 3 p.m.—The democrats claim a majority of 4,000, as far as heard from. No returns, but they gave a majority of over 4,000 in 1874. Three out of five congressmen are certainly elected; one doubtful.

**The Closing Ceremonies of the Centennial Exhibition.**  
PHILADELPHIA, 10.—In consequence of the rain, which has fallen steadily for several hours, the plan of holding the closing ceremonies in the open air has been abandoned, and the place of celebration changed to the Judges' Hall, where the invited guests only are admitted upon special tickets. President Grant, with Secretaries Fish and Cameron, are present. Among the other distinguished guests present are several Governors of States, Congressmen elect, representatives of foreign commissions, and legations and the centennial authorities. The first city troop, of Philadelphia, have taken position around the platform, and the preparations for beginning are nearly completed, some delay having occurred by the change of place. At about four o'clock President Grant will formally declare the exhibition closed.

**President Grant to Gen. Sherman.**  
The following are copies of telegrams sent at about noon, to-day, by President Grant—

"Philadelphia, Nov. 10.  
"Gen. W. T. Sherman, Washington, D. C.:  
"Instruct Gen. Augur, in Florida, to be vigilant, with a force at his command to preserve peace and good order, and see that the proper boards of canvassers are unimpaired in the performance of their duties. Should there be any grounds of suspicion of a fraudulent count on either side, it should be reported and denounced at once. No man worthy of the office of President should be willing to hold it if counted in or placed there by fraud; either can afford to be disappointed in the result. The country cannot afford to have the result tainted by suspicion of illegal or false returns."  
"Signed U. S. GRANT."

"Philadelphia, 10.  
"To Gen. Sherman, Washington:  
"Send all the troops to General Augur, he may deem necessary to ensure quiet and the peaceable count of the ballots actually cast. They may be taken from South Carolina, unless there is reason to suspect an outbreak there. The presence of citizens from other States, I understand, is requested in Louisiana to see that the board of canvassers make a fair count of the vote actually cast. It is to be hoped that representatives and fair men of both parties will go."  
"Signed U. S. GRANT."

**Troops for Florida—Excitement Intense.**  
WASHINGTON, 10.  
Four companies have been ordered from South Carolina to Tallahassee. They left this morning. General Ruger will accompany them to Florida.

The excitement here is more intense than ever, and crowds are congregated at many points throughout the city, discussing the situation.

**Still Another Estimate.**  
NEW YORK, 10.  
A 30 p.m.—The reports of the estimated majorities from Florida, Louisiana and South Carolina widely conflict. Probably nothing positively decisive from either of these States will be known before Monday next. Parties in the respective States estimate the majority as follows: Louisiana, democrats 5,000; republicans 4,000; South Carolina, democrats 1,200; republicans 1,200.

**More Excitement.**  
NEW YORK, 10.  
The political excitement over shadows interest in business, and for the moment the speculative markets of Wall Street are more swayed by dispatches relating to the vote of disputed States than by any other influence. In the stock market there was a rush in the first hour to sell all classes of shares without regard to other than political considerations. The market then became quieter, and a good part of the decline has since been recovered. The coal stock, however, are weak, and notably the N. J. Central, concerning which unsettling rumors are again in circulation.

**Close Vote.**  
CHICAGO, 10.  
The vote was unexpectedly close in this state at the late election between the Republicans and Democrats. Culdon's majority for Governor will not be nearly as large as was expected. The legislature is in doubt, with the chances that the Republicans will have a majority on the joint ballot. This will not, however, change the congressional gains telegraphed last night.

**South Carolina still for Tilden.**  
CHARLESTON, S. C., 10.—The latest revision of the returns by the News at Charleston, South Carolina beyond a doubt to Tilden and Hampton by over 1,200 majority.

**COWHIDING AN UNFAITHFUL HUSBAND.**—About two o'clock Saturday morning an interesting cowhiding affair occurred on the corner of Kearny and Post Streets. A well-dressed man, whose name has not been ascertained, was walking up Kearny Street with a woman affectionately clinging to his arm. When they arrived at the corner of Post Street, another woman, whose blood was evidently at the boiling point, appeared on the scene, and, suddenly seizing the man by the coat collar, she struck him a dozen or more blows about the head and face. As the blows descended, the enraged woman cried out: "I'll learn you to tell me you are going out of town to attend to business and then go promenade the streets with a good-for-nothing hussy. Oh! you wretch, to leave your poor wife at home and go off with another woman; take that, and that and that!" The blows were given with all the strength the poor woman possessed, and each one left its mark on the man's face. The woman who was leaning so fondly on the man's arm reviled a blow of the cowhide early in the action and made good time up Kearny Street. When the injured wife had exhausted her strength she released her hold of her husband's coat collar, and he lost no time in putting a safe distance between himself and his angry spouse.—S. F. Bulletin, Nov. 6.
