

ORPHANS' HOME ASSOCIATION.

The Finance Committee Present Their Report—A Boring Lecture.

At the annual meeting of the above association held on October 12th, the finance committee made the following report:

Today opens the eighth year of our organization. The seventh year has closed in many respects the most eventful year in the life of this institution. More money has been raised and expended, more children have been educated and cared for, more provided with homes, and a larger number are now in the home—thirty-seven—than at any time since its organization.

In June we moved into our new home. Out of the 100 beds, we had accommodations for seventeen have been employed.

The sum of \$4000 was expended upon the building above, \$500 upon walls, fences, putting the grounds into shape and a few articles of furniture.

We are now fitted for the accommodation of seventy-five children.

We are at present in debt about \$2000 for the building, the furniture, the water-tail, and about \$300 on small miscellaneous bills.

The monthly expenses are at this time as follows: Salaries \$25, housekeeper \$20, wash woman \$5.

No money is paid for living expenses. As we are non-sectarian, we draw upon all classes, sects and races, and it is wonderful how cheerfully and generously all respond to our appeals.

The most marked feature of the year is the fact that the children have given a weekly donation for seven years.

The building has been given, \$10 per month in supplies, generous donations have been made by our good friends, book and stationery, clothing, factory, wagon companies, the bakery, the insurance companies.

Two cows were donated by a lady, a house and three cows were bought last winter, for which seven were purchased. No bills for living expenses were paid during the year.

With the single exception of coal and potatoes purchased last November, the home has enjoyed the past summer an excellent garden. Over 125 bushels of potatoes were raised and consumed, and over 100 bushels of apples.

We told you a year ago that the outgoing board of directors had been the most inefficient. We tell you today that the board which succeeded this morning has been the most efficient.

The association overland. They have rendered more aid, devoted more time, raised more money, looked more carefully after the interests of these unfortunate children, have been more patient and self-sacrificing than any board before. They have stood their ground, they have been in perfect unity. The officers have been tireless in vigilance and attention—the result, no doubt, of the arduous and renewed interest the association has in the past year developed. The association has the last year been better represented at the monthly meetings, have more fully alive to the needs of the institution, have taken more interest in the directors, and responded quickly, nobly and generously when called upon.

With all the labor expended and care exercised the financial workings of the home have not been entirely satisfactory. Money has been so limited, our members so few and our task so hard. It is not your fault, our dear friends, the home has been grossly imposed upon, both by unworthy parents and unworthy employers. Our attention is made up of women, unacquainted with the lower walks of life and you have been slow in properly estimating the financial degradation and infamy of the element with which you have been brought in contact.

You will see from the report of the Finance Committee the large number of children who have been adopted and sent into good homes. The Education Committee will give you the number of children attending the Parents' week school, a most excellent school and where the children so far are making flattering progress.

We have come to a time in our history when it seems absolutely necessary for a Territorial appropriation. Other states and territories give large sums annually for the support of the fatherless and worse than, motherless waifs and strays. Utah has never appropriated one cent for the support of a home for the fatherless, an orphan asylum, a nursery or a child's home.

Our home is the only one in this vast Territory and just for one moment stop and think it over. Maintained, kept up and provided for all these seven years by the efforts of a few women in this city. Children come to our home from all over this Territory and not one deserting one has been refused admission when there was a vacancy.

We maintained this association go before the next Legislature and demand a right home recognition for this class of children. We read in the daily press of magnificent schemes maturing to see for centuries come to be appropriated for the Legislature the coming winter. While Utah is getting ready to flout herself at the World's Fair with her fine art, the street eyes of the world are for her big legs, her gaudy, her tattoo and her crazy quills, let us ask for a tenth of this to buy food for the destitute and orphaned children. If she would give some aid in this class she might find that the better element and the home Asylum in the near future would be less popular and require smaller appropriation.
