COUNCIL BLUFFS, 3 .- From the Nonpariel's statement, the following are the important figures: Receipts of freight over the eight I'nes of road terminating here, during 1880, were 8,886 cars, the average tonnage being 25,000 pounds per car. These cars were all handled and transferred at this point, which work necessitated the employment of about 500 men daily. Of the total number of cars 53,140 were west bound and 12,686 east bound. The total number of cars received during 1879 was 43,818, an increase of 1,849. The ticket sales of the eight city offices extended into millions; but CAPITAL, cannot now be accurately estimated.
