

The telegrams often come to us laden with news from the South American Republics, about revolutions, counter-revolutions, battles, assassinations, &c., in which rival bandit chiefs display their blood-thirstiness. In lieu of giving these petty sanguinary details in full, we clip the following from an exchange, which tells the story of that section of the earth so cursed by man, yet so blessed by nature:—

About one month before his death, General Bolivar, the so-called "Liberator" of South America, wrote a letter to the late General Flores of Ecuador, in which the following remarkable passages occur, which have never before been published in the English language:

I have been in power (yo he mandato) for nearly twenty years, from which I have gathered only a few definite results:

1. South America, for us, is ungovernable.
2. He who dedicates his services to a revolution ploughs the sea.
3. The only thing that can be done in South America is to emigrate.
4. This country will inevitably fall into the hands of the unbridled rabble, and little by little become a prey to petty tyrants of all colors and races.
5. Devoured as we shall be by all possible crimes, and ruined by our ferociousness, the Europeans will not deem it worth while to conquer us.
6. If it were possible for any part of the world to return to a state of primitive chaos, that would be the last stage of Spanish America.

THE OLDEST RELIC OF HUMANITY.—The oldest relic of humanity extant is the skeleton of one of the earlier Pharaohs, encased in its original burial robes, and wonderfully perfect considering its age, which was deposited about eighteen or twenty months ago in the British Museum, and is justly considered the most valuable of its archaeological treasures. The lid of the coffin which contained the royal mummy was inscribed with the name of its occupant, Pharaoh Mykerimus, who succeeded the heir of the builder of the great pyramid, about ten centuries before Christ. Only think of it; the monarch whose crumbling bones and leathery integuments are now exciting the wonder of numerous gazers in London, reigned in Egypt before Solomon was born, and only about seven centuries or so after Mizraim, the grandson of old father Noah, and the first of the Pharaohs, had been gathered to his fathers! Why, the tide mark of the deluge could scarcely have been obliterated, or the gopher-wood timbers of the ark have rotted on Mount Ararat, when this man of the early world, lived, moved and had his being! His bones and shriveled skin are cotemporary with the nineteenth century, and the date of the crucifixion is only about midway between his era and ours.
