HAPPY NEW YEAR.—Of course it will be a happy new year, the human family, including the printers, all know it to be a day of rest to the weary; therefore, as it is customary everywhere, there will be no issue of our paper to-morrow.

THEATRICAL.—The drama of "Mathilde" was performed for the fourth time yesterday evening, and considering the many amusements elsewhere, to a fair house. The drama was well acted. Madame Scheller's Mathilde gave us a faithful picture of a truly devoted wife and a dutiful daughter, her conflicting emotions, love and duty, were portrayed by her in a masterly manner. Mr. Waldron as Berthold Arnau was excellent. Messrs. Hardie, Graham, Lindsay, and Hyde filled their parts to the entire satisfaction of the audience. Mrs. Clawson made the character of Mrs. Garthine prominent and acted it exceedingly well. The Salt-Lake Minstrels, in their varied and interesting performance, were favorably received.

This evening one of the strongest bills is presented, the thrilling drama of "The Idiot of the Mill" and the Negro Minstrels in an entirely new programme, including a local hit entitled "A scene in Savage & Ottinger's Photographic Gallery." "The Idiot of the Mill" is a stirring melo-drama, with startling situations, among which the attack on the mill by the brigands and the destruction of the castle are most prominent. From beginning to end it is interesting, exciting and also amusing. Madame Scheller appears as Lendorme, the idiot boy, (singing several songs), Mr. Waldron as Pierre Lenoir and Baron Spackman, the Chief of the Black Band of death, Miss Adams as Mariette, Mr. Margets as Simon the Soft, and the rest of the characters in best hands. This time entertainment should attract a large house.—"The Idiot of the Mill" will not be repeated and a new programme will be given every evening.
