Sportsman's Paradise-A Well Watered Country.

Special Correspondence, Special Correspondence,
Grovent, Uinta, Co., Wyo., Aug. 26.—
This is a beautiful country, lying just
East of the Teton basin and the range
of mountains known by that name,
with near a score of streams of water
flowing in to the Snake river from all
sides, furnishing ample water for the
entire valley and then have a surplus.
Most of the streams require but little
work to turn them out of their natural
channels. All the waters abound with channels. All the waters abound with fish and the mountains with game, such fish and the mountains with game, such as the elk, mountain sheep, deer and antelope, making it a veritable paradise for the sportsman. Already we see tourists and sports from all parts of the world getting ready for the chase, as the hunting season begins the first day of September and ends the last day of November. A license of \$40 is required of all non-residents. The altitude of this valley ranges from about six thousand one hundred to six theusand seven hundred. o six thousand seven hundred.

The trustees are now engaged in making some such needed improvements in and around our district school house, the doors of which are to be opered on or about the 5th of October next for the admittance of pupils. An excellent corps of teachers has been secured.

The products of the country are principally hay and cattle, some of the finest grass beef being shipped each year from this mountain valley. Small grain and the hardy varieties of vegetables can be raised very successfully. We have two ward organizations and in very good running order. The health of the people is good and all are quite prosperous financially.

# IN THE BIG HORN COLONY, WYOMING

Land Under the Canal Has All Been Taken Up by Settlers.

ANOTHER CANAL TO COME.

Then There Will be Plenty More Ground-Secret of Success in the Great Colonization.

Lovelle, Big Horn Co., Wyo., August 27, 1900, To the Editor:

The people have come into the Bighorn Basin so fast that there has been enough to subscribe for all of the land under this canal which the Shoshone colony is working on. So there is no use for any person coming here with the expectation of getting land under it. But there is another large tract of land across the river from here that is equally good as this. There is some talk of starting a canai to cover that in the near future. There is plenty of land here for thousands of people to make homes on. The river beds are so deep that it takes a large body of men

to get the water.

I would not advise any person to come here to look for land until they are well equipped. Winter before last they had feed two months. The summers here are about the same temperature in the day time, but I believe the nights are a little warmer than they are in Salt Lake City. I believe that anything can be raised here that is raised in Salt Lake valley. The railroad is about 50 miles from

here at present, but they are working on a railroad at about eight or ten miles from here.

The water in the river is good, some of the wells are good, others are a little flat tasting.

There are a few farms, which are im-proved, for sale with a good water right. They range in price from \$10 o \$25 per acre.

Camp Shoshone is a "Tented City" on the beautiful Shoshone river. The population is strictly "Mormon." The spirit of "Mormonism" is seen on every hand. I did not hear what answer was given him. the other companies were seeking only the agrandisement of the incorporators, this incorporation sought only to bless their fellows, and to plant them firmly

in a condition of independence.

The country presents a very dry appearance, owing to the exceptionally dry season, but on the river bottom where the old settlers have a few farms, the products are very gratifying. Already the second crop of lucern is cut and the third crop promises to be as good as either of the former ones, and I believe a conservative estimate would place the product of the season

The brethren are progressing nicely with the canal under the direction of President Byron Sessions. The major portion of the work seems to have been done, and

It is proposed at an early date to quit work on the canal for the purpose of building houses and preparing for winter, and then it is hoped that what now appears hard for the good sisters to endure, by way of camp life, will soon be over, and their nice homes will sacrifice they are now making. sacrince they are now making. I can truly say that all seem contented, and the spirit of the Gospel is leading them in this enterprise, which is only the beginning of blessings to thousands of the Latter-day Saints.

CHEYENNE, WYOMING.

Surveying Reservoir Sites in Big Horn Basin and Elsewhere.

Chevenne, Wyo., Aug. 29,-Prof. F.H. Newell, chief hydrographer of the United State geological survey, is here on work connected with the survey of reservoir sites by the geological survey in the Rocky Mountain and Pacific Slope States. Prof. Newell has visited Montana, Idaho, Washington, California and Nevada, and after his visit to Wyoming, will proceed to Colorado.
The details of the surveys are placed in the hands of local representatives of the survey. Mr. Charles H. Fitch has been placed in charge of the work in Montana, Idaho and Wyoming.

In Wyoming the survey this season will be made of reservoir sites on the head of Grey Bull river in the Big Horn basin. Mr. Fitch will make Horn basin. Mr. Fitch will make an inspection of the country in the upper Platte valley and in the Black Fork and Big Sandy country with a view to further surveys of reservoir

Work is being continued on the geological map of the Sundance region and topographers are also working in the districts near Buffalo and Evans-

Colorado outside of stream measure-ments, there being a seeming indiffer-ence upon the part of Colorado people to having the geological survey extend its operations to that State.

terprise is now in preparation, the lo-cation being the upper Platte river, or Saratoga valley, in Carbon county. The main canal will issue from Brush creek, a tributary of the North Platte river, and will reach to the apex of the Saratoga Pass creek divide and will be Saratoga-Pass creek divide and will be eighteen or twenty miles in length.
