MISSOURI.

St. Louis, 20.—The McClurg Republicans of the first Congressional district, dominated by Z. Smith for Congress to-day, also a full county ticket. There are now three county and Congressional tickets in the field, and the canvass is becoming lively.
St. Louis, 21.—The national labor reformers have called a meeting to nominate a county ticket.
A jubilee was held this evening by the Association of Congregational Churches now in session here, the occasion being the two hundred and fiftieth year since the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers.

CALIFORNIA.

The San Francisco Fire.
SAN FRANCISCO, 21.—The fire on Fremont street last night destroyed three large mills and nine other buildings. Two hundred men are thrown out of employment. Three men are supposed to have been burned to death. The loss is over a quarter of a million.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Pittsburgh, 21.—A fire, this evening, destroyed the chair factory of Fenner & Co., in the northern section of the city. The loss is \$70,000, insurance \$50,000.

NEBRASKA.

Fire—Attempted Suicide.
OMAHA.—The First National Bank, at this place, was injured by fire, this morning, to the amount of about six thousand dollars.
A Mexican named Sam Williams, attempted suicide to-day. He took two ounces of chloroform and an ounce of arsenic. Two doctors, after four hours labor, saved his life. He was sent to jail.

OHIO.

CINCINNATI.—The shock of earthquake was greater in some parts of the city than was stated in the first report. In one large factory the operatives thought the foundations were giving way and caught hold of objects to steady themselves as the building swayed to and fro. At one of the iron foundries the men thought their tools were coming towards them but soon discovered that it was the building in motion. There was great alarm but work was not long suspended.
COLUMBUS.—Additional official returns show that Munro, Republican, has 726 majority in the 14th Congressional District, and Ufen, Republican, 4359 majority in the 18th District.

WASHINGTON.

Senator Cameron stricken with Paralysis.
WASHINGTON, D. C., 21.—At a cabinet meeting to-day only the ordinary routine of business was transacted. While the meeting was in session, information was received that Senator Cameron was stricken with paralysis, and that he would be sent home in a special car. It is said that his right arm and side are affected.

NEW YORK.

The World's special dated London 20th says, despite the efforts of the government to discourage such demonstrations, 20,000 people marched to the palace yard last night, and organized an immense meeting to express sympathy with the republicans of France. The speakers violently denounced King William, and an allusion to the apathy of John Bright was received with cries of "shame." The Gladstone government was bitterly denounced for its policy of abstaining from a defensive alliance with France, and resolutions were adopted calling on Parliament to abolish the pensions to German princes, including the Crown Prince of Prussia and Prince Louis of Hesse. It was declared that the sooner all kings and queens were dethroned the better. Ill feeling was manifested in all quarters of the city during the night, which was revolutionary and threatening. The government had two regiments of infantry under arms all night in their barracks, and extra police precautions were taken to repress any disorder, but no call was made for interference by the military or police.

FOREIGN NEWS.

PRUSSIA.
The French squadron their ammunition.
BERLIN 21.—The Staats Anzeiger advertises an issue of 60,000,000 thalers, at three and a half per cent, payable in six months.
Only 250 citizens of Strasbourg were killed at the bombardment of that city. At Verdun as Paris the besieged are guarding their ammunition by random firing.

GREAT BRITAIN.

British Catholics protest.
LONDON, 20.—A rumor prevails here that treaty negotiations are going on with Bazaine for peace. The report says that after peace is concluded, Bazaine's army with the released prisoners made at Sedan, will march on Paris to enforce the terms of the treaty.
At two this morning the Prussian embassy was insulted by a great concourse of people with whom the police did not interfere.
A balloon from Paris on the 17th reports preparations making by Trochu for an offensive movement on a great scale. Rough calculations give the city an abundant supply of fresh meat for two months to come, and of bread and hard provisions for five months.
LONDON, 21.—It is said Bismarck has requested the ministers at Paris to communicate with their governments only by open dispatches.
Later advices from Paris say breech-loaders were being made in the city.
The Prussians have evacuated Meung and Beaugency. The people were subscribing freely for the defense of the capital. The enthusiasm is not abated.
The Pall Mall Gazette, referring to the appointment of Morton, says a thoroughly incompetent person is selected to represent the United States in England, and is instructed first to bully and next to threaten war. This incompetent person hesitates, probably preferring a domestic skirmish with the Democrats to war with England.
The Catholic hierarchy of Great Britain have issued a protest against the action of the Italian government in the occupying of the Papal Territory. They call upon all good Catholics to form unions to protest against the treatment of the Pope and to prepare documents on the subject, which may be made the basis of an appeal to the British Parliament.

FRANCE.

Can't leave Tours.
TOURS, 21.—The Papal Nuncio and Columbian minister are unable to leave, owing to the refusal of the Prussians to allow any passage through their lines.
