On the selection of the name of Mr. O. F. Whitney, as nominee for Council from the Fourth Precinct, Mr. A. Isom, delegate from that precinct, said he could not consistently vote for Mr. Whitney, as he was not a resident of the dry bench, and his instructions were to vote for a man who lived on the bench. This was replied to by Mr. R. Patrick, also a delegate from that precinct, who sustained the nomination heartily, and was assured that Mr. Whitney, though not a resident of the bench, was a friend to the people who lived there, and would faithfully represent their interests in the City Council.

The vote on the nomination was then taken, Mr. Isom presenting the People's Party. The Central Committee were sustained for a further term of two years, and the Convention adjourned sine die.

The Woman Question.-Yesterday afternoon, another bill relating to the political rights of the women of Utah, was presented to the Legislature. The bill for an act to remove the political disabilities of the gentler sex has lain upon the table for some time, awaiting the action of the House. The latter is a modification of the former. It reads as follows:

A Bill amending section 43 of the Compiled Laws of Utah:  
Sec. 1.-Be it enacted by the Governor and Legislative Assembly of Utah: That section 41 of the Compiled Laws of Utah, be amended by the insertion of the following after the word "election" in the seventh line of said section: "And be eligible to hold the office of superintendent of district schools, trustee of any school district, treasurer, librarian, notary public, or any educational or clerical office."

The above, if it will be seen, defines the offices to which the ladies shall be eligible. It does not kill the other bill, which may be called up for action at any time and be approved or rejected as the Assembly may determine, but is merely a lighter measure on the same subject. Should the latter pass the House, it would not affect the other in the least, as that could also be subsequently acted upon, but if the former were to pass first, it can be easily seen that there would be no need of the latter measure, since its effect would be included in the one that had passed. The bill introduced yesterday was laid upon the table to come up in its order.

"Juvenile Instructor."-The subscribers of the Juvenile Instructor, who have not received the last two numbers of that magazine, will please attribute the delay to the non-arrival of paper ordered from the States in December. The type is up for both numbers, and all that is needed is the paper. The publishers regret the delay, and trust that their patrons will bear with them for a time, promise the back numbers at an early day.

Ogden's New Co-op.-Ogden is to have a new Co-op. building. Its location is to be on the site of the old Tithing Office, cross-cornered from Dooley and Co's Bank. It will be made of pressed brick, with stone corners, sills, etc., and will cost at least \$50,000. Its frontage on Main Street will be 115 feet and on Fourth Street 100 feet. Work on the foundation will commence in a few days. So we learn from the Junction.

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Valentine Party.-The Valentine ball season will be inaugurated on Friday evening, the 13th inst., in the Eighth Ward Assembly Rooms, under the auspices of the ward association. A fine time is expected and will no doubt be realized.

Born.-On Sunday last the wife of Edward McLelland, of the Third Ward, son of Bishop McLelland, presented her husband with a fine daughter, weight 11 1/2 pounds. The mother and child are doing very well.

Another Theory.-Another supposition in regard to the mysterious disappearance of William Elliott, the butcher, is that he has absconded on account of certain indebtedness which he was unable to meet. It is said that he held notes which were due the very day of his disappearance. Nothing is known definitely though. Many still believe the missing man to have wandered off and been frozen, and that his reputation was good and reliable for honesty in business matters.

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## THE MUNICIPAL CONVENTION.-The People's municipal convention was held last evening in the City Hall, at 7 o'clock. Hon. H. S. Eldredge was elected chairman pro tem, and H. J. Grant, secretary pro tem. A committee on credentials was appointed consisting of T. V. Williams, James P. Freeze and Charles Crow, and retired to examine the credentials of the delegates to the convention. While they were out short speeches were made by Col. R. Smith, and Messrs. J. West and A. J. Pendleton. The committee on credentials returned and submitted their report, which was received. The roll was called and a permanent organization effected, with Anselmus Miner, Chairman; H. J. Grant, Secretary; B. Y. Hampton, Sergeant-at-arms; S. H. B. Smith, doorkeeper, and Jos. E. Taylor, Chaplain. On motion a committee of ten, two members from each municipal ward, was appointed to make a selection of names for the action of the Convention. Following are the names of the committee: Joseph McMurrin and Wm. Hart, 1st precinct; Angus M. Cannon and Wm. McLauchlan, 2nd precinct; Alfred Solomon and James W. Phippen, 3rd precinct; Robert Patrick and Henry Puxey, 4th precinct; James P. Freeze and Miner G. Atwood, 5th precinct. Mr. A. M. Cannon was appointed chairman of this committee, which then withdrew to make the selections. Speeches were made during their absence, by Messrs. Miner, Pendleton, Isom, Williams, Pendleton, Smith, West, Schoenfeldt and Crow. The committee then returned and submitted the following report. The names were presented and acted upon singly, the method of voting being viva voce:
